

BILL TO RAISE WAR REVENUES.

Discussion of the Measure Continued in the Senate.

Efforts to Secure Unanimous Consent for a Final Vote Fail.

Daniel of Virginia Sounds a Note of Delay Against the Bill, Declaring There Was No Immediate Necessity for Its Passage, and Announcing That if Certain Provisions Were Not Incorporated He Would Offer Amendments Which Would Precipitate Debate.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Late this afternoon Allison of Iowa, in charge of the war revenue bill in the Senate, endeavored to secure unanimous consent that a final vote on the measure be taken on Saturday next before adjournment.

Teller of Colorado objected. Daniel of Virginia, in reiterating Teller's objection, sounded the first note of delay against the measure that has been heard since the debate upon it began.

He declared that there was no emergency which required the immediate passage of the bill, and frankly announced that if certain provisions in the bill put into it by the Democrats of the Finance Committee were not incorporated into it, he would offer some amendments to the measure that would probably precipitate debate.

Allen (Pop.) of Nebraska, in opening his speech, said that if the wishes of some, at least, of the advocates of the pending bill were consulted, it would carry only a provision for the issue of bonds, and would not place a cent of taxation upon the people.

He declared that there was not the slightest necessity for the issue of bonds at this time. The debt caused by the war ought to be liquidated without the creation of a debt.

In concluding his speech, Allen took strong ground against any proposed alliance between this country and Great Britain, declaring that he would oppose it with all his power, until England should give to Ireland what the United States gave its people—home rule.

Caffery of Louisiana presented an extended legal argument against the proposed tax upon corporations, taking ground similar to that assumed by Platt of Connecticut and Lindsay of Kentucky yesterday.

At the conclusion of Caffery's speech, Morgan of Ohio moved to lay the pending amendment, that of McHenry of Louisiana, exempting from the corporation tax limited liability corporations engaged in planting, upon the table.
