FOURTH OF JULY COMMITTEE

IT DECIDED TO HAVE A BIG PARADE.

Committees Appointed and They Will Get to Work as Soon as Possible.

The Fourth of July Committee appointed by Mayor Land met last night at the Trustees' room, a good attendance being present.

The meeting was called to order by the Mayor, who stated that his object was to have arrangements made for a rousing old Fourth of July celebration.

He was elected Permanent Chairman, S. Luke Howe Secretary, and D. W. Carmichael Treasurer.

A discussion arose as to whether or not there should be a parade. A. J. Johnston, J. H. Devine, George B. Katzenstein, J. B. Devine and Emmet Phillips taking part, and it was finally decided to have a parade.

Mr. Phillips moved that the Mayor be given several days in which to select his committees.

Corporation Counsel Devine thought that a number of military men and members of civic organizations should be placed on committees, even if they were not present at this meeting.

George B. Katzenstein thought the Mayor could make his selection immediately from the parties named by him on this committee.

Mayor Land said that he felt just as well qualified to appoint the committees to-night as any other time.

The motion was withdrawn, and the Mayor then declared a recess of ten minutes, in order that he might appoint committees, and when the meeting was called to order again he announced the committees as follows:

The Mayor said he thought he had made a good selection of committees, and he hoped that they would start in and do their work promptly.

He wanted to have a rousing good celebration this year, and for that reason had called the committees together early.

He hoped that all the committees would aid in making the celebration a success. He had watched each year to see what portion of the celebration gave the most satisfaction to the people, and was satisfied that it was the Horribles that they wanted most.

That is what keeps the people in the city all day, as it is what they want most to see. He hoped that the committees would make a liberal appropriation for the Horribles. He did not think \$2,000 would be enough for a good celebration, and that there should be \$2,500.

He would go out with others and canvass to raise that amount, if necessary.

General Martin thought the City Trustees and Supervisors should give enough for the celebration, and that business men should not be called on.

They had already been called on for almost everything this season.

The Mayor said that, if Mr. Martin knew how low the state of the city's finances was, he would not think so. There is only \$1,400 in the immigration fund. He was not anxious to canvass for subscriptions, but would do so. He had himself given liberally to the convention fund, and if necessary would put his hand in his pocket for \$100 for this purpose.

Trustee Devine moved that the committee meet on Wednesday evening next, and that the General Committee meet next Thursday night. Carried.

Trustee McKay suggested that the Finance Committee call on the Supervisors and see what they would contribute.

R. H. Hawley moved that the Secretary notify the Chairmen of the several committees to immediately call together their committees and report next Friday night. Carried.

The meeting then adjourned till next Friday night.
