

WAR REVENUES DEBATED IN SENATE.

Gorman of Delaware Makes a Notable Speech,

Denouncing the Supreme Court Decision on the Income Tax.

Takes Issue With the Majority of His Fellow Democrats on the Proposition to Coin the Silver Seigniorage and Makes a Powerful Argument in Favor of the Issuance of Bonds to Raise Funds to Prosecute the War.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—A notable speech on the war revenue bill was delivered in the Senate this afternoon by Gorman (D.) of Maryland. In the course of an argument in support of a tax on corporations...

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deed, I have every reason to suppose that it will.

Teller then began a discussion of the proposition to coin the silver seigniorage, which he said had aroused great opposition. He declared that the seigniorage could be coined without detriment to the public service.

Briefly advertising to the proposed corporation tax, Teller said that he hoped to have an opportunity to vote for a tax that would apply to individuals and firms as well as corporations, he would be glad to support the corporation tax proposed in the pending bill.

Teller then entered upon an elaborate argument for the issue of \$150,000,000 of legal tender notes, concerning which he thought there was no possible doubt of the right of the Government.

Teller said he was considering the pending measure without reference to the silver question, merely with a desire to have the country adopt a sound system of finance. He was opposed to the issue of bonds as unnecessary and dangerous.

Nelson of Minnesota regarded the proposition to issue greenbacks as one of the most important features of the bill. He declared that all the loans made during the civil war, the forced loan covered by the greenback was the most expensive. The proposed issue of legal tender notes was not called for by any lack of money in circulation, as the per capita circulation was now higher than at any time since 1862, and only 11 cents lower than it was then.

Cockrell contended that the bill as reported, including provisions for the coinage of the seigniorage and the issue of legal tender notes, would provide sufficient revenues for the conduct of the war.

Gorman of Maryland said he approved of some provisions of the House bill, and some of the amendments made by the Senate committee. The burdens ought to be placed upon the large interests able to pay the taxes, instead of upon the people regardless of their condition.

Now, he declared, "while we are engaged in war, to test the Supreme Court on the corporation tax. A decision against it will not destroy our financial structure, but it would destroy the court. The American people would amend the Constitution so that in time of war taxes might be levied upon all interests justly and equitably."

Gorman then formally presented his amendment to the bill, providing for a tax upon corporations, which was brought out yesterday by White. He made a strong defense of his provisions and appealed to the Senate to engraft it upon the bill.

In the course of a discussion of the proposed coinage of the silver seigniorage, Gorman held that it involved a political contention of eight years' standing. "It is not a political question," it would be unwise—it would be fruitless to attempt to force that question to the front while the country has the Spanish army and navy to confront. I cannot vote for it at this time, no matter how just it may be in the abstract or as a proposition standing alone."

Gorman advocated an issue of bonds, and declared his opposition to the issue of legal tender notes.

Allison, in charge of the bill, proposed that a time be agreed upon to vote upon the series of amendments relating to corporation taxes.

Jones (D.) of Arkansas objected on account of the numerous important amendments offered to the bill, which had materially altered the situation. It was agreed that the Senate should meet at 11 o'clock to-morrow.

At 5:15 p. m. the Senate went into executive session, and soon afterward adjourned.

Cannon made the point of no quorum, and a roll-call of the House followed. It was more than an hour before the requisite quorum appeared. The appeal was then laid upon the table.
