Among other things, and after warmly congratulating Chief Dwyer on the latter's appointment, the writer says: "This is as far as I have reached. I got a good position here shortly after I arrived, and may stay here until fall, but may be on the road to the interior any day. A person cannot figure ahead in a country like this. "Skagway may turn out to be quite a place. We are to have a railroad to the lakes. The first work was started to-day. The ties and rails are on the road now. If the interior proves as rich as it is claimed to be, which no doubt it is, this will be a great business point. "I have met a great many from the gold fields here, and there is not one that has been there but who returns. That is a good indication. I met a great many people from Sacramento here, and there are several here yet. Rooney and P. Cox of Polson are running the California pack train, and are doing as well as the rest. "I heard that Charley McCarty of Sacramento, who got shot here some time ago, had his leg amputated to-day. He is here in town, and is well. "The ice on Lake Bennett is about gone, and the same on Linderman, and
