

THE ASTOR BATTERY HERE.

A LARGE CROWD WELCOMES THE NEW YORKERS.

Refreshments and Flowers Distributed by the Red Cross Ladies.

The railroad depot was crowded at 6:30 o'clock last evening, when Astor's Mountain Battery reached this city on its way from New York to San Francisco, where it will be joined with the troops destined for Manila.

The battery consists of four officers and ninety-eight men, but a Lieutenant and a detail of men were left at St. Louis to take charge of the seven carloads of horses and mules that were started with the battery, but which were dropped there, it being learned that unacclimated animals would be of no use in the tropics.

The officers with the troops are Captain March, Lieutenant Koehler and Lieutenant Williams. The men composing the battery left a favorable impression on the Sacramentoans who welcomed them. They are an athletic-looking lot, and the gentlemanly in the features of each and every one of them. In selecting his battery John Jacob Astor evidently carefully eliminated the hoodlum element, and the good behavior of the volunteers was refreshing when compared with that of some of the troops who have preceded them.

The ladies of the Red Cross Society made the short stop in this city as pleasant as possible for the troops, and sandwiches, coffee, fruits and flowers were distributed with lavish hand.

Apparently all the members of the society are singers, and many of the voices had volume and tone seldom heard out of professional ranks. An octet rendered several popular songs in exceptionally fine style, and when they joined their comrades on the train a half-hundred voices joined in singing the popular songs, such as "The Old Oaken Bucket," "A Hot Time in the Old Town" and "Farewell."

The ladies of the Red Cross were very active while the troops were here, and were most favorably impressed with the gentlemanly bearing and politeness shown by privates, non-commissioned officers and those who wore the straps. When the Astor battery returns from Manila, after the war is over, it is safe to say the reception that it will

receive at the hands of Sacramento's citizens will be a right royal one.

On the train following came detachments of other troops, and altogether the Red Cross people fed some 300 hungry men yesterday. Alfred W. O'Brien, proprietor of the Ann Arbor Bakery, sent a quantity of coffee-cakes and doughnuts to help out the ladies, who greatly appreciated his generosity.

The soldiers were also well supplied with flowers, the major portion of which were sent by the Bell Conservatory.

BEN. P. LAMBERTON.

New Commander of the Olympia, Admiral Dewey's Flagship.

Recently the very serious illness and death of Captain Charles W. Gridley of Admiral Dewey's flagship Olympia made it necessary for a new commander to be appointed for that vessel, and the honor fell to Benjamin P. Lambertson. He is a native of Pennsylvania, and graduated from the Naval Academy in 1895. Since that time he has seen service in many parts of the world and has worked himself up to the rank of Commander by the faithful performance of his duties on land and sea.



Among the ships on which he has served are the Sigsbee, Junata, the Alaska, the Vandallia and the Jamestown. He is an officer of much ability, and his selection for the command of the flagship is pleasing to those who know him well. Captain Gridley, who commanded Lambertson's replacement on the flagship, was a man of rare courage and daring, and won great distinction for himself at the battle of Manila on May 1st. He occupied the conning tower during the fighting, and was exposed to great danger from the guns of the Spanish fleet. His death is a great regret to those who knew him.

PELICAN GUN CLUB.

Yesterday's Live-Bird Shoot Won by Upon.

Yesterday was a perfect Sacramento June day. It was, according to the Weather Bureau's record, a "normal" day—not one degree warmer or cooler than the average for that date. Consequently people who could get away from our enervating and sultry atmosphere, and this interfered with the attendance at the Pelican Gun Club's

annual meeting. The alarm of fire sent in from box 62 yesterday was caused by a spark from a chimney setting fire to the roof of Mrs. E. Grubler's residence at 2129 H street. The department responded promptly, but when the firemen reached there the flames had been extinguished with garden hose. The damage was nominal.

ANOTHER PEST.

"In the gardens about Salinas there has appeared this year an insect feeding upon the beets, which appears to be capable of doing considerable injury. It is a small maggot which burrows in between the membranes of the leaf, eating out all the green substance, and when full grown, fall to the ground, producing an oval, brown pupa, in which is developed a fly about the size and general appearance of the common house fly.

"This insect lays its eggs upon the beet leaves, generally two, side by side in a place, and the young worms when they hatch from these eggs again enter the leaves and begin their work. The eggs are very conspicuous slender white bodies, found on both the under and upper side of the leaf, and the shells remain attached to the leaf often long after the worms hatch from them and become adult and enter the ground. The insect appears to have two or three generations in a year, and seems to be capable of doing a great deal of injury, especially upon the sugar beet, where the effect of the destruction of the green matter of the leaf would materially reduce the sugar contents of the beet.

"The insect appeared to be so threatening in character that the university has undertaken to determine the distribution of the insect and the extent of the injury. It is not known whether this insect is the European species, which it resembles in its method of entering the beet leaf, or one of the numerous Californian species of this group, now become prominent through the extension of the growing of the sugar beet. It was thought that if the insect were a recent European importation its distribution might be limited enough to make attempts at its eradication feasible. The investigation so far made shows, however, that it is very widely distributed and feeds upon all kinds of beets. This would indicate that it has been in the State for years, and so it is very likely that it will not prove to be as serious a pest as at first imagined.

"The university would, however, be glad to receive specimens of affected leaves from every part of the State, in order to make-out fully its distribution. The affected leaves can be readily recognized by the large, irregular pale blotches made by the work of the maggot, and by holding the leaf to the light one can readily see the maggot crawling about within the leaf. The presence of eggs, as described above, will also enable one to recognize the pest."
