

HAWAIIAN DEBATE BEGUN IN SENATE.

Annexationists Gain a Victory on a Show of Strength.

Consistently Defeat a Motion of Opponents to Adjourn.

Proceedings of the Day Tend Clearly to Indicate That There is to Be No Debate Upon the Question in the Ordinary Acceptance of That Term, the Purpose of the Friends of Annexation Being Not to Consume Time in Making Speeches.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Discussion by the Senate of the question of Hawaiian annexation was begun to-day in open session. At the very opening of the question the opposition of annexation quite unexpectedly scored a point by preventing a vote and may vote on the taking up of the resolution.

White of California instantly made the point of order that a vote could not be had on a dead issue—that the resolution was already before the Senate by unanimous consent.

The opponents of annexation were decidedly pleased at preventing a show of strength, but at 4:30 this afternoon white offered a motion that the resolution be considered on the day after to-morrow.

Having gained his point in developing the numerical weakness of the opposition, Davis readily agreed to enter a motion for an executive session.

The proceedings of the day indicate clearly that the friends of annexation upon the Hawaiian question in the ordinary acceptance of that term. It is not the purpose of the friends of annexation to consume time in making speeches.

The quick disposition of the morning business and the large attendance in the Senate indicated intention on the part of the Senators to press the Hawaiian question to the front as rapidly as possible.

In answer to an inquiry from Hoar of Massachusetts, Davis said it was the purpose of the Foreign Relations Committee to occupy not only the morning hour, but the entire time of the Senate in the consideration of the Hawaiian annexation resolution.

Hoar said he desired simply to obtain time at an early date to have considered the conference report of the bankruptcy bill, and he hoped there would be no objection to its consideration.

After the transaction of some minor business, the Vice President declared the Hawaiian resolutions to be before the Senate.

Almost immediately afterward Frye of Maine rose and said that as the Senate was entering upon an exceedingly important matter, he sincerely hoped that the Chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee would insist that it would be considered without delay.

was not absolutely necessary as a war measure. He thought the Senate ought not to adjourn at 4 or 5 in the afternoon, but should sit as long as possible, in order to facilitate the consideration of the resolutions, which, he added, he had passed in an early date.

White of California instantly rose and made the point of order that the resolution was already before the Senate, and that he yeas and nays could not be had upon a dead issue.

The point was sustained by the Vice President, who announced that he had already declared the resolution to be before the Senate.

Jones of Arkansas said he desired to say in response to Frye's statement that if harsh measures were made in the beginning by the friends of annexation he wanted to warn them that it would be necessary to keep a quorum in the Senate chamber at all times.

Morrill of Vermont then took the floor to address the Senate in opposition to the resolution. The venerable Senator spoke in a conversational tone, but was accorded close attention by the Senators.

Morrill said he was unable to concur with the learned Committee on Foreign Relations in regard to such annexation, whether by treaty, by joint resolution, by flagrant executive usurpation or in any manner which leaves an open door for their admission into the Union as a State.

At the conclusion of Morrill's speech Bacon of Georgia entered upon a discussion of the constitutional objections to the annexation of Hawaii, which he maintained that the annexation of territory is necessarily and essentially the subject matter of a treaty.

At this point Jones of Arkansas made the point of no quorum, and the roll call was called, showing the presence of sixty-one Senators.

"I made the point of no quorum," explained Jones, "not because I desire to delay consideration of the pending resolution. I insist that if the rigid methods are to be resorted to with which we were threatened in the Senate a quorum shall remain in the Senate to listen to the arguments presented.

"I do not want to delay the proceedings, but I do insist that Senators shall remain here, and I shall deem it my duty to make the point of no quorum when the quorum is not present.

This statement brought Wilson of Washington to his feet. "If," said he, "with some heat, we, on this side of the chamber, are to be continually embarrassed by points of order, I hope the Chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee will exercise his right under the rules of the Senate to proceed to the consideration of this matter in continuous session.

White instantly moved to adjourn. Davis asked for his belief on the motion. The motion was defeated—44 to 15. Those voting for adjournment were: Bacon, Bate, Berry, Butler, Chilton, Clay, Cockrell, Jones of Arkansas, Malloy, Pasco, Pettigrew, Roach, Turley, Turner and White.

White expressed the opinion that for the first day of the debate the Senate had done pretty well. He expected to proceed with the debate to-morrow, but would not proceed to-day. He suggested, therefore, that Davis move an executive session.

The pending disposition of the motion, which Davis made at once, some routine business was transacted. A resolution concerning the purchase of law books, books of reference and works of military information for the War Department was adopted.

The Senate then, at 5:25 p. m., went into executive session, and at 5:45 p. m. adjourned.
