It has been ascertained that two battleships can enter the harbor abreast, one passing to the right and the other to the left of the Merrimac wreck. This is an opportunity that will be of great advantage to Admiral Sampson when the final attack on Santiago begins.

Lieutenant Hobson and his men are still in communication with the fleet. There is little prospect that they will be exchanged before the attack on Santiago is made.

REIGN OF TERROR AT HAVANA

Blanco Orders Shot Anyone Who Criticizes Government's Policy.

KEY WEST, June 27.—10:35 a. m. (Copyright, 1898, by the Associated Press).—The most authentic and reliable news yet obtained of the true condition of affairs in Havana was today furnished in a report to the Associated Press by a British subject who left Havana on the British cruiser Talbot, and who arrived here yesterday.

He says a reign of terror exists at the Cuban Capital. Captain General Blanco has issued a proclamation announcing that any one daring to express an unfavorable opinion or suspected of being dissatisfied with the present policy of the Government, will be summarily shot without trial or investigation. This proclamation, it appears, caused dissatisfaction among the members of the Orden Publico, or police force, who are treated as revolts if full rations were not given them. It is expected that as the Orden Publico is a numerous body trouble will result. Its members are themselves policed, while patrolling the streets, while Spanish infantry and artillery soldiers are maintaining guard over them at every corner.

Famine, it seems, is imminent, and the stories of the arrival of supplies at Havana via Batabano are pronounced to be untrue. The informant of the Associated Press thinks Havana cannot possibly hold out six weeks longer. The city is pronounced to be panic stricken, its inhabitants expecting every moment to be bombarded by the American fleet, as they realize that Captain-General Blanco's attitude releases the United States from the obligation of holding the customary bombardment notice.

Riots are daily expected at Havana, as the troops are suffering from hunger, and the volunteers see their wives and children dying from want. Under such conditions, the Captain General cannot but longer keep the military forces in check, and a rebellion is likely to devastate Havana before the city is captured by the Americans. Captain General Blanco admits that the situation is desperate. He recognizes, it is pointed out, his inability to control his troops, goaded by hunger, much longer, and he is reported to have said that he will never leave Havana alive, as he is prepared to take his own life when the outbreak occurs.

Senior Galban Rio, a prominent Spanish merchant, the refugee continues in his statement to the Associated Press, had a thousand bags of flour hidden at Guenados, a suburb of Havana, and was retreating to the public. General Arolas, the Military Governor of Havana, was informed that Senior Galban's trucks had traces of fresh flour upon them, and he caused the vehicles to be followed. The store being disclosed, it was seized and distributed among the ravenous soldiers.

Referring to the strength of the Spanish forces, the Briton says there are 120,000 men under arms at Havana, and that a great number of them are ready to surrender rather than die of hunger.

In conclusion, the gentleman says he credits the reports that the gunners at Morro Castle and at other Spanish batteries were taken from foreign warships, and he says the Consuls, including Mr. Gollin, the British representative, are strong Spanish sympathizers. British Vice Consul Arastegui, he continues, is a Spaniard by birth and a reporter for "La Lucha," the mouthpiece of the Government.

Mr. Gollin, the British Consul General, further remarks, gave a dinner on the Queen's birthday, at which all the guests were Spaniards, and three British subjects, prominent socially and financially in Havana, were, it is alleged, relegated by Mr. Gollin's orders to the forecastle of the Talbot
