

ATTRIBUTES OF CHARACTER.

LECTURE BY REV. WAYLAND HOYT LAST NIGHT.

Rev. Wayland Hoyt of Philadelphia lectured last night to a good-sized audience on "Attributes of Character."

He said that in the early days of the church it was contended that something more than faith in Christ was needed, and even Peter was smothered, so to speak, with the early ritualism, until Paul withstood him to his face and showed that faith in Christ and a spiritual life were all that was necessary.

Martin Luther withstood the drift of ritualism and superstition, and left this side of him a free, open field for belief. Abraham Lincoln withstood the drifts of slavery and left a regenerated nation.

Joah of Arc changed the Frenchmen from their wickedness because she withstood the drift with the spirit of faith and religion.

BIDS FOR COUNTY ROAD SPRINKLING.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT the Board of Supervisors of the County of Sacramento will on THURSDAY, July 3, 1898, at 3 o'clock p. m., at their office on I street, between Sixth and Seventh streets, Sacramento City, California, receive and open sealed bids for sprinkling the following county roads:

Upper Stockton road from County Hospital to Duden's blacksmith shop, about three miles.

Vine street, from Upper Stockton road to Whiskey Hill, two and a half miles.

J street road, from east end of macadam to Harney's saloon, one mile.

M street road, from Thirty-first street to Perkins, four and one-half miles.

Folsom road, from Perkins to Mayhews, three and a half miles.

Mayhews to Mills, three and a half miles.

Perkins to Walsh Station, three miles.

Upper Stockton road, from County Hospital to Old Elk Grove, about seven miles.

From Old Elk Grove, via Elk Grove Station, to Sheldon, about six miles.

Commencing at George Duden's shop on Upper Stockton road, south one mile to Florida road, at the corner of Sixth and Eau Gardiner's line, about four miles.

From the north line of the town of Franklin south on New Hope road, to the intersection of the Franklin and river road, thence west to the Sacramento River, thence down said river to Gammon's warehouse, about six miles.

From the north line of the town of Sturpevaek's blacksmith shop, all of A street, B street, and C street, to the railroad. All of C street. Two blocks on D street. One-half mile from water tank going south on New Hope road. Successive blocks west of railroad on E street, thence south to widening on New Hope road. Two blocks on First street (from Harney's house). All of Second street. All of Front street. All of Fifth street. Sixty street, from B to E street. All of Oak avenue. All of Simons street. McFarland's road, one and a half miles.
