

HOURS FOR IRRIGATION.

MAYOR'S RECOMMENDATION REGARDING THEM.

Mrs. Cody Gets the License She Has Been Fighting So Hard For.

The Board of City Trustees met in regular weekly session last night, Trustees McKay, Tebbets, Douglas, Paine, Dolan, Kent, Brown and Devine being present and President McKay presiding.

Mr. Eagan, a resident of E street, complained that he had been ordered to put down his sidewalk, but could not do so until his next-door neighbor moves his fence back off the sidewalk.

Trustee Douglas said that a lady in the block had been compelled to move her fence, being arrested, and he did not see why all should not be treated alike had not let politicians be exempt.

Deputy City Surveyor Phinney said the person in question had been notified to move his fence and if he did not do so would be arrested.

MAYOR'S MESSAGES. The following messages from the Mayor were read: To the Board of Trustees: I hereby transmit to your honorable body the report of the Water Inspector for the month of June, 1898.

WILLIAM LAND, Mayor. To the Board of Trustees: I hereby nominate, and by and with your consent, appoint William E. Glick to be a special police officer for the locality bounded by E and J and Twentieth and Thirty-first streets, Sacramento City, vice self, term expired. Very respectfully,

WILLIAM LAND, Mayor. To the Board of Trustees: I respectfully report that in company with D. McKay, President of your board, and A. De Ligne, Esq., City Attorney, this day I counted the money placed before me by the City Treasurer, and found in his possession money as follows: Gold, \$113,750; silver, \$446; total, \$113,754.46.

To the Board of Trustees: I hereby nominate, and by and with your consent, appointing Leo H. Makree to be a policeman of the First Division, to fill the vacancy made by absence of C. J. Renkin shall return, in accordance with a resolution recently adopted by your honorable board. Very respectfully,

WILLIAM LAND, Mayor. To the Board of Trustees: Much complaint has been made about the scarcity of water throughout the entire city for domestic purposes during irrigation hours. It has been reported to me and reliably so, that in certain portions of the city, for the period of more than four hours, not a drop of water could be obtained for drinking purposes; this is a distressing condition of affairs and we should find some way to remedy it.

I would respectfully recommend that all water-takers line up at the center of K street be allowed to use water for irrigation between the hours of 9 and 9 o'clock in the morning, and those living south of the center of K street be allowed the same privilege during the hours of 5 and 9 o'clock in the evening. I suggest this plan be tried for a month as an experiment, and, if successful, that it then be adopted. Very respectfully,

WILLIAM LAND, Mayor. Trustee Devine moved that the Mayor's message with regard to the water from the general fund to the sewer fund and \$250 to the street fund, and bills on those funds were paid.

GETS HER LICENSE. The Corporation Counsel gave his opinion in the matter of Mrs. Cody's application for a saloon license on Second street, to the effect that there is nothing in the charter to prevent the board from granting a license because it had previously refused one to the applicant.

Trustee Dolan moved that the petition be referred to the Chief of Police. Trustee Devine moved that the license be granted, and claimed that no complaint had ever been made of the place she formerly conducted on Front street.

Fred. Burke, who owns the building rented by Mrs. Cody, addressed the board, and said that if the board would grant the license for three months, and Mrs. Cody did not keep a decent place, he would rent her the place no longer.

J. D. Moynahan addressed the board in the applicant's behalf. He claimed that the parties protesting against this license were doing so to depreciate the property in order that they might buy it cheap.

Trustee Brown said that he voted against the license before on the recommendation of the Chief of Police. He wished to stand by a young man who is trying to make a record in his profession, and has backbone enough to stand up for what he thought was right. He thought the board should encourage his efforts in that direction.

Trustee Tebbets spoke in favor of granting the license, and did not think the Chief of Police would object. He moved the license be granted. The license was granted. Dolan voting no and Brown not voting. The claim of the horrible vomiting for \$4.10 was allowed, it being explained that the 10 cents with the \$4 just exactly cleaned up the immigration fund. The \$1,000 appropriated to the Fourth of July Committee was also allowed.

LAND OFFICE EXAMINATIONS.

FOR POSITIONS IN THE CIVIL SERVICE.

To be Held in California Cities on the 27th and 28th of This Month.

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that examinations may be taken on July 27 and 28, 1898, at various cities for positions in the offices of the Surveyor General, Register and Receiver, in the following States and Territories. The examinations will be taken in any other city where the commission has a competent Board of Examiners. The California cities named are: Los Angeles, Sacramento, San Diego, San Francisco, Santa Barbara and Redding.

The positions for which these examinations will be held are as follows: First—Chief of office, stenographer, typewriter and Land Office bookkeeper. Second—Clerk with a thorough knowledge of land law and a general knowledge of the system of public land surveying.

Third—Clerk with qualifications of a land surveyor, including plotting, computing and drawing, and also with a knowledge of the system of public land surveying. Fourth—Thoroughly competent topographic draftsman, with a general knowledge of surveying, including the system of public land surveying.

The subjects for these examinations are as follows: First—First grade basis (except arithmetic, which is the second grade), 20 per cent.; practical tests in stenography, 30 per cent.; practical tests in typewriting, 30 per cent.; and bookkeeping as practiced in the United States Land Offices, 20 per cent.

Second—First grade basis, 50 per cent.; public land laws of the United States, 35 per cent.; and general questions of the system of public land surveying, 15 per cent.

Third—First grade basis, 30 per cent.; public land laws of the United States, 20 per cent.; surveying, including public land surveying, 50 per cent.

Fourth—Letter-writing 10 per cent.; arithmetic and elementary mathematics, 20 per cent.; public land laws, 30 per cent.; elementary land surveying, 10 per cent.; topographic drawing, 30 per cent.

Applicants for appointment to these positions in Arizona and New Mexico must have some knowledge of Spanish. The time allowed for each of these examinations is two days. The basis and the practical tests in Land Office bookkeeping will be given on July 27th, and the practical tests in stenography and typewriting will be given to applicants on the 28th of July.

Trustee Tebbets said that the electric company, which had put so low a price on lights and saved the city so much this year, had asked the board before it bid to specify the number of lights it wanted, but the members neglected it. The citizens should be protected and given the light they have asked for.

Trustee Douglas said that the new posts put up by the company had not been furnished with arms like the old ones. He did not believe the contract was complied with.

Trustee Tebbets said the lights on K street should be put up in the middle of K street. The motion to pay for thirty or less poles was carried.

The Street Committee was instructed to see that all the new poles are furnished with arms long-enough to give sufficient light on the street.

Mrs. Carie was granted six months in which to construct a sidewalk, provided she makes the present one safe, and the board adjourned.

OREGON REFUGEES. Two of Them to be Returned to That State for Trial. Governor Budd yesterday issued a warrant on a requisition from the Governor of Oregon for the arrest and return to that State of J. E. Pamplin, who is wanted in Union County on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses. Pamplin is a member of the Oregon United States volunteers now encamped at the Presidio.

The Governor also issued a warrant for the return to Portland of George Childers, who is wanted on a charge of larceny. Childers is the man who hired a couple of bicycles from Portland, sold one and shipped the other to this city, where he was arrested. Deputy Sheriff Harry Meyer started north with his prisoner last night.

AN EXPLODED CARTRIDGE. It Nearly Destroyed Hartley Peart's Eyesight. A few days ago Hartley Peart was severely injured in the face by the explosion of a cartridge which he was trying to force into the breach of a shotgun. The accident happened at Idelwild, on the bank of Lake Tahoe.

Mr. Peart, whose home is in Berkeley, had been brought to the city for treatment. Though at first his eyesight was thought to have been injured, he will probably completely recover from the effects of his injury.

BATTERY A. Nearly Fifty Men Now in Camp at the Race Track. Sergeant C. M. Mayberry of Battery A, Hart's Brigade, states that there are now thirty-four men and five officers in the camp at Agricultural Park. Three new men were accepted yesterday. Citizens have been very generous to the recruits who are awaiting news that the brigade will be mustered into service, for which the latter feel very grateful.

The Sergeant states, however, that the men, who are without means, would greatly appreciate donations of tobacco, as well as other things. PUPILS' EXAMINATIONS.
