MAHER AND GODDARD.

The Irishman Defeats His Former Conqueror Easily.

NEW YORK, July 8.—Peter Maher defeated Joe Goddard to-night in eight rounds at the Lenox Athletic Club. The fight had been scheduled for twenty-five rounds with five ounce gloves. Goddard had defeated Maher on two previous occasions, and was the favorite among the sporting element before the fight.

Goddard administered a lot of hard punishment to his adversary, but received a terrible pounding while he was doing so. Goddard was out a couple of times, but the bell saved him, and when he quit toward the end of the eighth round he was scarcely able to stand on his feet. At the same time the fast work which both had gone through from the beginning had told on Maher, and he was unable to land a blow heavy enough to finish the Australian.

In the first round, in a lively exchange, Maher hooked his right to the head and put Joe to the floor. Goddard's nose was bleeding when the gong sounded.

In the second Goddard's defense was bad, and Maher got at him frequently, but did not do great damage. After some rough fighting in the third Goddard went down again from a left swing on the face. When he got up Maher sent him down again. At the close of the fourth Goddard got in a couple of lefts on the head that staggered Maher.

Round five saw Goddard lying on the floor, and he stayed down nine seconds. Maher repeated the performance when Joe got on his feet, and the latter again took nine seconds rest before rising. The next two rounds were full of hard hitting on both sides, but in the eighth Maher brought his man to his knees.

The final round started lively, Goddard trying hard to reach Maher effectively, but Peter landed repeatedly on head and face.

Goddard is now unable to defend himself, and held his head down with his arms crossed in front of his face. Maher went at him, but could not land a knockout blow. Goddard backed away and stretched out his hand, saying "he can do so." "This is more than you can stand!" as he shook Maher's hand.

The referee then awarded the fight to Maher. Time of round two minutes and fifty-five seconds.

HAWAIIAN COMMISSION.

The President Has Not Yet Named the Members of It.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—The Hawaiian Commissioners who are to constitute the Government of those islands have not yet been appointed. The deferment of the announcement of choice is due to the pressure of other duties on the President. As recess appointees they can proceed immediately to the execution of the governmental functions, though open to confirmation when Congress reconvenes.

The appointment of the members of both the international Canadian Commissioners to settle all disputes between Canada and the United States and the non-partisan industrial commission to investigate the entire subject of immigration, labor, manufacture and business, also have been deferred until later, and will be made as recess appointments, subject likewise to confirmation at the next session. This announcement is authoritative.

Secretary Day went to the Cabinet meeting to-day carrying a large portfolio, which was thought to contain the names of some of the Commissioners to be appointed on the Hawaiian Commission and the Canadian Commission. Before he left the department Senator Elkins had a talk with him on the Canadian Commission, and Justice McKenna and Senator Perkins saw him relative to the Hawaiian Commission. As a result of the talk there was some mention of the names of Senators Gray, Democrat of Delaware; Hoar, Republican of Massachusetts; Representative Dingley and Hon. John W. Kasson as among those likely to go on the Canadian Commission. They were, however, only conjectural, as it was known that the President himself had not reached a determination as to the personnel of the commission up to the time of the Cabinet meeting.

At least one of the commissions will be named very soon, but the other is likely to be deferred.

Troops to be Sent to Honolulu.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—As a result of the Cabinet meeting to-day, it was decided to dispatch a regiment of troops to Honolulu immediately, and the commandant at the Presidio, Cal., has been commended with to learn what forces are available.

MINERS' CONVENTION.

Both Committee Reports on Revision of Mining Laws Rejected.

SALT LAKE CITY (Utah), July 8.—On the assembling of the International Mining Congress this morning the majority and minority reports on the revision of the mining laws were taken up for discussion.

Ex-Congressman C. L. Allen of Utah offered the following resolution: "That it is the sense of this International Mining Congress that the mining laws of the United States be so amended as to do away with extra lateral rights in mining claims; and, secondly, that we hereby instruct the President and Secretary of this congress to forward at the opening of the next session of the United States Congress to the Senate and House of Representatives, respectively, and also to the Secretary of the Interior, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, each, a copy of this resolution."

Allen made a strong speech in favor of his resolution.

Colonel Montgomery of Colorado, President-elect of the congress, advocated the resolution, but said it did not go far enough.

Abner Graves of Colorado called for the previous question, which brought a direct vote on the resolution, and it was adopted by a safe majority without a rollcall.

Separate votes were then taken on the two committee reports, and they were both rejected.

The committee was then discharged with a vote of thanks.

W. S. Keys of Colorado introduced a resolution setting forth that inasmuch as the Canadian Government makes no discrimination against citizens of the United States going to the Klondike district, that our Government should make no reciprocal lands in regard to the public mineral lands in this country.

Francisco Yanes then addressed the congress on "The Mineral Resources of Venezuela."

Reinforcements for Shafter.

CHARLESTON (S. C.), July 8.—The cruisers Yale and Columbia, with the Sixth Massachusetts and one battalion of the Sixth Illinois aboard, lie off the lights at the entrance of the harbor to-night, and probably will sail before daybreak for Cuba. General Nelson A. Miles and his staff arrived in the city at 6:30 p. m. and went out to the Yale. The expedition numbers in all 1,720 men. There are still in the city 4,000 troops and others are expected here from Chickamauga.
