He said that the pipe in which the air is forced into the tunnel ends about 100 feet nearer the shore than the workings where the men were employed when the explosion occurred.

Should it happen that any of the men lived they would as speedily as possible make their way to the end of the pipe, for a time at least. As the air enters where they would be assured of safety the tunnel from the pipe with considerable force, it would have a tendency to force back the pure air and create a space of at least ten feet, where comparative safety would be assured.

The highest and lowest temperatures one year ago yesterday were 104 and 72 degrees, with a hot night, and one year ago to-day 101 and 72 degrees, with a hot night, being two extremely hot nights in succession, which is something very unusual for Sacramento's climate.
