

A CHICKEN THIEF PLUGGED. GOOD SHOT IN THE DARK BY A BOY.

Maurice Derr Defends His Parent's Property in Their Absence.

On Tuesday night somebody carried away from Lefe Derr's roadside place, a short distance beyond the County Hospital, a pig and a hen, and the thief was seen to hide beneath the hide, and judging from the quantity of blood he left along his trail, the fellow must have been pretty seriously wounded.

It was a case of chicken stealing, and the thief was shot by Derr's sixteen-year-old son, Maurice, and Mrs. Derr were away, and only their two sons and young daughter were at home.

About 9:30 o'clock in the evening the younger boy discovered someone in the act of trying to steal some chickens in the rear of the house.

County Detective Max P. Fisher and Deputy Sheriff Schwilke went out there yesterday and made inquiries for many miles along the road, but could not find anyone who had seen the chicken thief.

MEETING OF GRANGERS. Proceedings of the Farmers' Alliance at Florida.

A correspondent of the 'Record-Union,' writing from Florida, gives the following report of the Farmers' Alliance there this week: The Sacramento County Farmers' Alliance held its regular quarterly session in Alliance Hall on Tuesday.

Both Were Shut Off for Some Time Last Night. The electric power and light sections of the Sacramento Electric, Gas and Railway Company's system were in part shut down last night for several hours.

The reason for this shut-down, which will be corrected to-day, was the concurrence of two things, say the company managers—a sudden and unlooked-for fall in the American River and an accident to the relay power by engine at the same time.

A new and powerful steam plant has been placed at the sub-station in this city. When the sudden fall in the river happened the load the engine is to carry was thrown upon it, when certain connections proved defective and the reserve motive power would not take up all the load it is intended to carry.

It became necessary, therefore, to shut down the engine to correct the defect it developed. This, it is believed, will be fully accomplished to-day. The company says it was impossible to form the unfortunate conjunction of sudden fall of the river and the development of the defect in the reserve motive power, which, by the way, is a remarkably fine piece of machinery and intended to develop between 600 and 700 horse power.
