

WHEEL RACE TO-MORROW.

THREE MILES OVER THE RIVERSIDE ROAD.

Eighteen of the Best Riders in the C. C. W. Club Will Compete.

The details for the club road race to-morrow by the Capital City Wheelmen have been completed, excepting the announcement of the prizes. These, say the officers, are donated by generous friends of the club, and are useful without being clubbish articles, and are intended more as simple recognition of the club spirit of the men than to compensate for the output of energy in preparation and racing.

Owing to the road conditions, the prevailing winds, and the location of the straight-away, the race will begin at or near Lake View (Oak Hill) on the Riverside road, and finish just south of the bridge over the canal, making a distance of three miles. Neither end is intended for a finish. One is heavy and the other rough. But against wind, or even without it, men cannot finish after a hot run in heavy ground. Indeed, to order it would shut out riders, many of whom will not undertake it.

It is a great pity that there is not four miles of good roadway anywhere near the city, where a fine road race can be held. Even on the Riverside, at half-distance, there are heavy stretches, which terrorize a rider who has been speeding an suddenly strikes them. It is "blugging" then, that wheelmen say is "killing."

The officers of the race are to report to the President at the clubrooms on Sunday morning at 9 sharp for instructions, except the starter, clerk, Captain and one timer, who will go out to the far end of the course and meet the men there at 9:15 sharp, and when the placing will be had and the start made, exactly at 10, watches at either end being justified to the fraction of a second. The handicapping will be on time, not distance, thus making the start a very interesting one to witness.

The officers of the day have been named by President C. W. Goethe as follows: Referee, V. A. Dodd; Judges, J. A. Woodson, H. Taubner, Goethe and Francis T. Dwyer; scorers, W. T. Small, W. A. Stephenson and Frank M. Woodson; timers, Edward W. Adams, George Stronan and W. H. Young; starter, J. E. Little; clerk of course, Dr. Clifford Todd; Captain, Robert E. Smith.

The officers request that cyclists and drivers will not drop in behind racers until the last man has passed, and indulgence is asked for any delay which the race. They must remember that some of the men will be handicapped as heavily as a minute and a half, and possibly more, as against earlier starters, so that it will be the fastest men who will be seen last.
