



New York Post: The paper on the theater and the state which Sir Henry Irving, in his capacity of Rede lecturer, read before the University of Cambridge the other day, was, perhaps, more ingenious as a demagogue when he spoke of the resources to be reckoned among the arts—a proposition which few persons would be disposed to dispute—than convincing as an argument in favor of the establishment of a national playhouse supported by a State subsidy. This was the aim and purpose of the drama, apparently meaning the chief aim and purpose, is to cultivate the imagination, and through this means to bring home to heart and mind the lessons which tend to advance the race, and he then proceeded, with no little felicity of expression, to dilate upon the stimulating and purifying effects of the imagination upon anxious, jaded and melancholy minds. All this is true to a certain extent, but it is not upon its power of giving temporary relief or gratification that the theater can afford to rest its claim for governmental support or aid.

The Municipal Art Society of New York has invited a competition for a bronze base for a standard similar to those in the Piazza di St. Mark's at Venice. The society, which has completed the design for a standard to be erected in the plaza before or on the steps of the City Hall in New York. It is estimated that such a standard, to be not more than fifteen feet in height, could be cast in bronze and set up in position for about \$3,000. It is expected that this sum should cover the cost of making the original model. The design must be so elaborated as to demand an increased expenditure. The society says in instituting this competition, that it does not undertake the erection of the standard, nor pledge itself in any way to the competition, but the successful competitors will be rewarded by the payment of the cash prizes to competitors. At the same time it declares that in view of the fact that the present city flag-staff projects in an unsightly and undignified manner from the roof of the City Hall, it is not unreasonable to hope that, should a worthy design be obtained, the necessary funds for the erection of a proper and suitable standard may be forthcoming either from the city treasury or private munificence.

The competition will be governed by the rules embodied in the constitution and by-laws of the society. The competition will be open to all, and the conditions and prizes are as follows: Each competitor shall submit a plastic design and a drawing to the scale of two inches to the foot. The design shall be in color only. The cost of casting and setting up the design shall not exceed the sum of \$3,000, exclusive of the cost of the original model. Each competitor shall submit a typewritten specification with his design, describing such portions thereof as are not fully shown by it. The design shall bear no marks whatever to reveal the identity of the designer, but must be accompanied by a plain white envelope containing his name. The designs and models must be sent to E. Hamilton Bell, Secretary, Municipal Art Society, New York, on or before October 15, 1898. Upon rendering a decision the following prizes will be awarded and paid: First prize \$400, second \$200, third \$100.
