

LEVI C. CHANDLER'S DEATH.

PASSING OF ONE OF SACRAMENTO'S PIONEERS.

The Veteran Printer and Real Estate Agent Dies at a Ripe Old Age.

In a plainly-furnished, almost barren room adjoining his office at Third and J streets, Levi Crosby Chandler, one of the oldest and best known of Sacramento's pioneers, passed peacefully away about 9 o'clock last night after an illness that had confined him to his bed for several months. For nearly a half-century Mr. Chandler had been a familiar figure in Sacramento, having come to California with the Argonauts of '49.

Although connected with one of the oldest and most prominent of American families, he died comparatively alone, having no relatives on this coast. In fact, his death came so suddenly and unexpectedly that his business associate, George O. Hayford, did not reach him until after he had breathed his last.

Mr. Chandler's life had been a busy one, as the following biographical sketch from the "History of Sacramento County," compiled some years ago by W. J. Davis, shows:

"L. C. Chandler, one of the prominent Sacramento pioneers, the distinction of being a California pioneer, is a native of New York State, born at Columbus, Chenango County, on the 15th of August, 1826, his parents being Elijah and Mary (Whitney) Chandler. His father, who was a farmer, was a native of Vermont. The Whitneys were an old Connecticut family.

"L. C. Chandler, the subject of this sketch, was reared at his native place to the age of 16, and there he received his school training. In 1842 he went to Boston and commenced the printers' trade in the office of the Boston Journal. He served a regular apprenticeship there and worked as a journeyman in Boston and other Eastern cities. When the news of the discovery of gold in California in 1848 electrified the country, he was working in a book store in New York City and he was not slow in making up his mind to try his fortunes in the new Eldorado.

"He interested himself with others in forming a party for that purpose and an organization was effected under the leadership of a physician, who, however, finally broke down and died. There were 141 in the company, each of whom put in \$21.50 in a common fund for expenses. They chartered the bark Mara (Captain Parks) and on the 30th of January, 1849, left New York harbor.

"They sailed to Vera Cruz and thence proceeded by the national road through Jalapa, Pueblo, City of Mexico and Guadalupe, to Mazatlan. It had been their intention to take shipping at that port for California, and most of them did so, but Mr. Chandler was one of twenty who decided to make the trip by land, and he was one of those who took the hurricane deck of a mile.

"While in Sonora the party divided, and Mr. Chandler continued his journey via Hermosillo, Tucson, Los Angeles, San Buena Ventura and Pacheco into Mariposa mines. He afterwards went to Stockton and from there down Livermore Valley. In the spring of 1850 he went back to Stockton, thence to Calaveras mines, and worked along the Stanislaus River, at Mormon's Gulch and Angel's Creek.

"The next scene of his mining efforts was at Ohio Bar, on the Yuba. When the Smith River excitement came on he went to Crescent City. From there he went to San Francisco, and thence to Marysville. His finances were then at a low ebb and he obtained employment driving mules from Marysville to American Valley, in Plumas County. "In 1855 he came to Sacramento and under the name of the "Union." He was one of the five men that started the "Bee," and followed the fortunes of the paper for nearly a year, then went to work on the "Union" again. He followed the printing trade till 1864, and since that time has been engaged in the real estate business, which he has made a success of.

"Mr. Chandler has always been a champion of the cause of temperance, and has been for twenty years Treasurer of Sileam (Good Templars) Lodge. He was a charter member of Cosumnes Tribe, Red Men. He is now the only living representative of his family in Sacramento. He was a soldier in the Mexican war, and was in the battle of Palo Alto, a private in Company B, First Illinois Infantry Regiment. He was honorably discharged on expiration of service, at Camargo, Mexico, June 17, 1847. Since that time trace of him has been lost.

MUST BE STOPPED.

Persons Swimming on the Water Front Will be Arrested.

Chief of Police Dwyer took some energetic steps yesterday to abate what has become a nuisance to the residents of Washington and the women who have to pass over the bridge.

It is safe to say that any found hereafter disrespecting themselves unclad in the river will pay a heavy penalty for it.

A fact worthy of the attention of mothers was developed yesterday, Chief Dwyer catching one little three-year-old child and another 5 years old, in the water among the boys, while there were a number that were a little older. Mothers would do well to keep track of their children, or they may find them at the coroner's.

Called by the County Committee for Tuesday Next. There was a meeting of the Republican County Central Committee last evening for the purpose of preparing the call for the County Convention, which call appears elsewhere in to-day's paper.

It was decided to hold a primary election throughout the county on Tuesday next, the 16th instant, for which the officers and polling-places were named. The County Convention will be held on the 18th.

Caucuses for selecting delegates to be voted for at the primary will be held in each ward or precinct on Monday evening, the 15th, but this is only an incidental matter, with which the County Committee has nothing to do.

SERIOUS CHARGE. George Henry of Folsom Accused of Criminal Assault. On a warrant issued from Justice Henry's court, at the instance of District Attorney Ryan, a man named George Henry, a resident of Folsom, was yesterday arrested on a charge of sustaining criminal relations with a thirteen-year-old girl named Grace Finch, who had been placed by her father in Henry's family, and his wife having separated and the child being without a home.

The arrest was made by Officer Dan Healy of the Children's Protective Society, and Henry is now in the County Jail. He is a married man and an employee of the American River Land and Lumber Company.

To Box at the Bay. A San Francisco paper states that next Wednesday evening the Merchants' Athletic Club of that city will give a boxing exhibition. Among the contestants will be one between Jack Mahon of that city and Ed. Bogart of the Sacramento Athletic Club. They will fight at 125 pounds.

The Way to Do It. It is a long while since the County Jail had so few prisoners as now, these being less than fifty behind its bars. The firm stand taken by Judge Hart in meting out punishment to criminals is doubtless having the effect of ridding the community of lawless persons.
