ROOSEVELT'S LETTER. Los Angeles Herald: The letter of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt to the Secretary of War, in which he assumes that the Rough Riders and the regulars are the whole thing, is a bit of indelicacy, to call it by no harsher term, that we thought Colonel Teddy incapable of.
