Two supreme spiritual convictions seem to me to stand out as the very sum and substance of Browning's religion. The one is the absolute union of power and love in God; the other is the strenuous joy of the life that is to be.

The absolute union of power and love in God. If a man hold that, then the light of his foot, amid all his days, and no care can ever long depress, nor any sorrow last.

We have in Browning's "Christmas Eve" the hint of how came to him the faith that the Supreme in power is no less the supreme in love.

Again, in his early poem, "Paracelsus," he utters in words, which General Gordon declared had more often inspired him to conquer gloom than any others outside the Bible, this same great faith in the high life that is to be:

I shall arrive! What time, what circuit first, I ask not; but unless God sends His hand Or blinding fireballs, sleet or stifling snow, In some time, His good time, I shall arrive.

The famous painting "Le Bol Vert" by the American artist, John W. Alexander, has been purchased by the French Government. At the present moment, when Franco-American relations are somewhat strained because of our war with Spain, this purchase is regarded in art circles as a unique artistic triumph.

The "Literary Digest" of recent date gives a very interesting resume of Homer B. Hulbert's article on Korean and Asiatic art, published in the magazine in the Korean Repository of Seoul.

There is something curious and interesting in all this. With other people the love of nature is simultaneous in its development with a general taste for all the arts, songs, form, color, everything that is beautiful or pleasing to the senses.

And yet, in spite of the lack of refinement of artistic taste, these Asiatics have a wonderfully impressive nature. No one enjoys the spring more than they; no one can sit on a hillside and look out upon a scene half veiled by the dreary autumn haze with more passionate pleasure than they.

Washington, Sept. 3.—The advance guard of the National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, which will be held here next week, began arriving to-day. These early arrivals are arranging the headquarters of different State departments for the rest that will be here Monday. Quite a demonstration is expected here on Monday, as the Labor Day parade will then take place, on Tuesday the Grand Army parade, on Wednesday the civic and industrial parade, with the peace jubilee on Thursday.

Pacific Railroad Bonds. WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—The Secretary of the Treasury has issued a call offering to redeem the balance of the bonds, amounting to \$14,004,500, issued to the Pacific railroads. Of this amount over \$9,000,000 was issued to the Central Pacific, over \$3,000,000 to the Union Pacific and over \$1,500,000 to the old Western Pacific. These bonds will be redeemed at the Treasury at a rebate of one-half of 1 per cent. of their face value at any time during the month of September. This is on the basis of 2 per cent. per annum. These bonds were to mature January 1, 1899.

Yellow Fever in Florida. JACKSONVILLE (Fla.), Sept. 3.—Nine cases of yellow fever were reported to the Board of Health to-day from Orwood. One case has developed at Waterford, a small village five miles east of Water Valley. The board regards the situation as rather serious. Surgeon Cather of the United States Marine Hospital service left for Taylor's Station and Orwood to-day on a special train. There are now twenty-two cases at Orwood. One death has been observed.

Spanish Peace Commissioners. MADRID, Sept. 3.—It is currently reported that the Spanish Ministers at yesterday's Cabinet meeting selected the three Peace Commissioners as follows: General Rafael Certero y Saenz, General of Engineers; Senor Eugenio Montero Rios, Senor Villadur, Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs. The Carlists declare that after protesting in the Cortes against the policy of the Government they will withdraw.

Private LaDuke in Prison. LEAVENWORTH (Kan.), Sept. 3.—Private Alex LaDuke, Company I, Second Wisconsin Volunteers, was placed in prison here to-day to remain for life for the murder of Private Stauffer of the Thirtieth United States Infantry in a saloon row at Ponce. LaDuke asserts that he shot Stauffer in self-defense.

CHESS NOTES.

Capital City Chess Club's Tournament on the 20th Inst. The members of the Capital City Chess Club are now steadily practicing for the coming tournament, and are looking forward to a royal time throughout the fall and winter months.

Losker, the worthy champion, has formulated the following rules for the development of a game of chess: "No. 1—Do not move any pawns in the opening of a game, but the King's and Queen's pawns.

"No. 2—Do not move any piece twice in the opening, but put it at once upon the right square.

"No. 3—Bring your Knights out before developing the Bishops, especially the Q. B.

"No. 4—Do not pin the adverse K. Kt. (by B-Kt 5) before your opponent has castled.

In regard to Rule No. 1, you will sometimes, especially in Q side openings, find it better to advance the Q. B. P. two squares before obstructing it by your Q. Kt. The above directions are well worth the attention of all chess players.


