

THE SUTTER ISLAND LEVEE.

TRUSTEES WANT PAY FOR MAKING A ROAD.

Supervisors Will Help the City to Clean Out the Y-Street Canal.

When the Board of Supervisors convened yesterday Grove L. Johnson addressed the board on the subject of the Sutter Island levee contract. The work had been deferred until now, he said, because there was no money in the fund to pay it.

Chairman Morrison said the other time when the City Trustees asked for assistance in cleaning the canal they had been told that the money was not in the fund.

Mr. Brown said that it had been proposed that the Supervisors should employ a chain gang, the city to pay men as guards, but that the money could not be allowed, that the work should be done by laboring men, as free labor, there being plenty of men in the city who need the work.

Chairman Morrison said he also desired free labor, and moved that the board contract for two-fifths of the cost, providing it does not exceed \$1,250 in cost.

Supervisor Curtis said he would second the motion on condition that the work be done by day's work, an itemized account to be furnished to the board, and provided that the money from the country outside the city wish to do some of the work shall not be barred on account of not living in the city, also that the work shall commence at once.

The motion as amended was carried. After passing a number of claims, the board adjourned till to-morrow morning.

CITY BOARD OF EDUCATION.

IT ESTABLISHES A KINDERGARTEN SCHOOL.

No Action Taken on the Reinstatement of Miss Bernard Last Night.

The City Board of Education held an adjourned meeting last night, Directors Driver, Sherburn, Stack, Johnson, Ransom, Atkinson and Elliott being present.

A number of bills were allowed. The various committees made reports regarding repairs needed and in course of being made.

The Secretary was instructed to request the Chairman of the Committee on Course of Study to call the committee together and make a report to the board on the outcome of their deliberations, especially as to the new course in drawing.

Superintendent Erlwine stated that there is no kindergarten between Tenth and Q and Twenty-fourth and N, and the residents of that portion of the city desire one. It has been difficult heretofore, however, to find a room.

It is now ascertained that the basement of the Christian Church at Sixth and L streets can be obtained for \$20 a month, and is very suitable for that purpose. The outfit can be bought for \$40, and the expense will be \$115 a month.

The Secretary was authorized to establish a school at the place designated, with the Committee on Furniture and Supplies, to purchase the necessary furniture.

Superintendent Erlwine said it would be necessary to elect a Principal for the new kindergarten. Chairman Driver thought that one teacher should be sufficient for it at present, and Miss Price was in the line of promotion.

Director Elliott nominated Miss Price for Principal, and she was elected unanimously. The election of another substitute in Miss Price's place was deferred until the next meeting.

A proposal to furnish the "National Music Course" was referred to the Committee on Course of Study. It was moved to enter into a contract with E. B. Hines for blinds that are needed for the schoolhouses at Fourth and Q, Tenth and Q, Twenty-seventh and J, Thirtieth and G streets, at a cost of \$180, and excited some discussion.

The matter was referred to the Committee on Furniture and Supplies to figure on the number of blinds needed and report.

MISS BERNARD'S CASE. S. R. Hart addressed the board in relation to the petition for Miss Bernard's reinstatement as Principal of the school at Fourth and Q streets.

He said he appeared for the petitioners, and not for Miss Bernard. He was authorized by them to state that 90 per cent of the citizens in that part of the city would sign a similar petition. He wished the board to eliminate from their minds all that had been said about Miss Bernard by the press and other parties, and simply look at the request of the petitioners.

He realized that Miss Bernard had been employed as Principal, but asked if it was fair to set aside Miss Bernard, who had served faithfully for so many years.

A Mr. Murphy said that the people all favored Miss Bernard and wanted her reinstated. He had had to remove his boy to the Christian Brothers' College, because the Principal-elect could not handle him. He thought Miss Bernard should be reinstated.

There being no motion before the board, the order of business was taken up. Director Sherburn said that the Jewel filter had not yet been placed in the schools at Tenth and P and Tenth and Q.

It was ordered that the agent be notified to put it in place, by the 19th inst. Mr. Egan, for the Pasteur filter, reported that he had put in all the filters allotted to him except two, and they are being put in place.

The board then adjourned. Died at Napa. At the Napa State Hospital yesterday morning Mrs. Manuel, wife of Frank Manuel of this city, passed away. Prior to becoming an inmate of the hospital, something over four years ago, Mrs. Manuel lived on Q street, between Second and Third streets, where she had a large circle of friends. The remains were brought to this city last night.
