variously measured separately in boxes of proper relative dimensions before mixing.

"The specifications provide for such thorough tamping as will fill all voids.

"This, the contractor claims, can be done with full 12-inch layer of concrete and one tamping.

"The inspector holds that the deposit of material for concrete must be in two 6-inch layers, each separately tamped, or 'double tamping.'

"The specifications further provide that the three-quarters of finishing material shall be smoothly laid on.

"The contractor claims that ordinary float finish complies with requirements.

"The inspector claims that smooth finish means trowel polish.

"Sand acceptable for the body of the structure was pronounced by the inspector unsuitable for finish, because of the presence of defects in the finish due to infrequent foreign substances that could not be washed out of the sand.

"This complete deadlock of opinion stopped all work, pending an adjustment of the different interpretations of specifications. I deemed an investigation of the opinions of experienced concrete men advisable to relieve the friction, pronounce upon the character of the material and to fix upon some mode for continuing the work in accordance with plans and specifications and without further wrangling or delay.

"A. Teichert, for whose integrity and skill in such work, Captain Hall of our board will vouch, and James Touhey, Superintendent of Streets of Sacramento, were selected by myself to investigate the work, examine the material, interpret the specifications and determine an equitable solution of the different views held by contractor and inspector. They held:

"First—That the tamping, though better done in 6-inch layers, would answer requirements if done in one layer of a foot.

"Second—That smooth finish means float finish and not the trowel polish being exacted by the inspector.

"Third—That the sand and cement were excellent in quality.

"Fourth—That the blotches, though detrimental to appearance, were unimportant, common in concrete work and not injurious to any determinate extent.

"Finally—That the inspector's ruling would entail the extra expense of two tamper, the trowel polish man, and one man and team for hauling the finishing sand desired by the inspector.

"I have accepted the conditions imposed until such time as the Commissioner or Auditing Board may order discontinuance, in preference to reversing the decision of my inspector. The extra cost will be between \$600 and \$1,000. Your opinion is requested."

Samuel Montgomery of Woodland, who holds the contract for furnishing brush fascines for filling in between the rows of piles at the Newtown Shoals jetties, complained, through Commissioner Leake, that, owing to delays in beginning work on the jetties, he had been put to considerable extra expense, and requested that at least \$2,000 be allowed him for work performed.

Commissioner Leake explained that Contractor Montgomery has now 1,600 cords of fascines on the river bank near Knight's Landing, and that owing to delays in driving the piles at Newtown Shoals he was obliged to have them insured. He pays his men every week and has been at a great expense.
