



A collection of 136 letters written by Charles Dickens to various correspondents was sold in London lately for \$745.

The British Museum has acquired for its reading-room a facsimile of the original manuscript of Bret Harte's poem "The Heathen Chinese," which first appeared in the "Overland Monthly" of San Francisco, in September, 1870.

It is again "definitely announced" that Sarah Bernhardt will play "Hippolyte" in London next season at the request of the Prince of Wales. It has been rumored for some time that the tragedienne was very anxious to attempt the role.

Aix-les-Bains is to erect a statue to Larmarine to commemorate his famous song, "Le Lac." Supposedly by those verses the poet immortalized the Lac de Bourget. The sculptor is M. Weiteme.

A tablet to the memory of Benjamin West, the famous colonial painter, was unveiled recently in the house in Swarthmore, Pa., in which he was born in 1758. The house was built in 1774, and was remodeled a few years back, but the walls of the original building and its quaint architecture are still preserved.

The recent election of Edwin A. Abbey as a member of the English Royal Academy was expected by all Mr. Abbey's friends and followed his election as an associate two years ago. Mr. Abbey is now 46 years old, and was born in Philadelphia. While he has produced many works of the highest order, his most famous in this country, at least, is probably the series of decorations representing the legend of Sir Galahad in the Boston Library.

New York Times: James McNeill Whistler has been at work on a new edition of his "Gentle Art of Making Enemies," for over a year, but the pleasing anticipation that has been patient so long in London does not seem to have diminished. Everybody is wondering who will form the target for the supplementary pages of the butterfly book. The volume created a great and general stir when it first came out. Anybody but Mr. Whistler would have had a revised edition in press years ago; not so Mr. Whistler, his publisher, Heinemann, had to be begged to make it. Of course, the job must be done artistically, but ars longa, vita brevis, and Mr. Whistler's enemies are rapidly passing to the great unknown. Millais is gone, and Burne-Jones died the other day. Only Ruskin, with a mere coronal guard, is left. Heinemann now promises the book for September.

New York Times: The art dealers and artists of New York are deeply interested in the news of the purchase by the London art dealer Asher Wertheimer of the celebrated Hope collection of paintings. The purchase price is said to have been \$607,500. The paintings which form the collection at Depeigne, the Hope estate, comprises many of the most notable examples of the early English school, and the collection is especially rich in Gainsboroughs, Reynoldses, Laurences and Romneys. It also includes many famous examples of the old Dutch and Flemish schools. Its passing into the hands of a dealer, who will presumably dispose of the paintings to individual purchasers and thus disperse it through the art world, is therefore, an event of extraordinary interest. Already the New York art dealers are speculating on the probability of some of the more noted canvases coming to America.

George Moore is writing a sequel to his new novel, "Evelyn Innes." Evelyn's life in a convent is to be dealt with in this book. We are told that Mr. Moore writes out his novels first in the form of a short story and then builds up his books around it.

Anthony Hope's new novel, to be published next year, is to be called "Born in the Purple." Mr. Hope, it appears, is the author of just one poem, which appeared the other day in a little souvenir journal in London. Here it is: Life is love, the poets tell us, In the little books they sell us; But pray, my man, what's the use of Life if Love for Love's the Deuce.

Milton, "Poems, both English and Latin," 1645, with brilliant impression of the portrait by W. Marshall—£80; the Kelmscott Press edition of Chaucer, 1890—£57; "La ref des folz du Monde," 1497, the first edition of this version of Bryant's celebrated work—£21 10s., and Ptolemaeus, "Geographia," 1507—£21.

In the Massey Mainwaring collection, sold in London recently, there was a number of tankards of old silver, with many curious specimens of old plate. The silver included a flat top tankard, with armorials, 1693, probably the work of Timothy Day, 28 ounces, at 28s. per ounce; a ditto, spouted, 1681, 30 ounces, at 50s. per ounce; a ditto, William and Mary, 1691, 15 ounces, at 65s. per ounce (these three articles are described in Crisp's work on "Plate"); a plain pierced potato ring, old Irish, 13 ounces, at 63s. per ounce; another, with birds, flowers and subjects, 12 ounces, at 58s. per ounce; a very fine ditto, with Chinese temples, birds and

"Whereas, Mr. Fox has shown himself, in our opinion, a gentleman above the average in not stigmatizing the whole race on account of the guilt of one man; by kindly placing another colored boy in the position made vacant by the discharge of Mr. Ross; now, therefore be it

Resolved, That we, the Afro-American League, in behalf of the colored people of Sacramento, tender to Mr. Fox our heartfelt thanks for his kindness in the above matter, and trust he may never have occasion to regret it."
