TWO EX-CONVICTS.

Burglar Suspects Caught After a Hard Chase.

There was a great chase and final capture of burglar suspects in the vicinity of Fourth and J streets about 10 o'clock yesterday morning, and in a remarkably short space of time an immense crowd gathered, the individuals of which swarmed information and spread new rumors broadcast.

The story most rolled under the tongues of the news purveyors was to the effect that an aged man who was leaving the California State Bank, after drawing down a bag full of money, was knocked down by a robber who attempted to relieve him of his wealth.

The truth of the matter, as obtained from the officers interested, is that the convicts named George Smith, alias Hines, and Tom and John Woods, had been in the city several days and were suspected by the police of having burglarized the house of Ah Sam, the Chinese interpreter, on Seventh street, last Saturday.

Chief of Police Dryer yesterday set Special Officer Brown to watch the men, and about 9 o'clock, when near the California State Bank, Brown started in to arrest the gang. He successfully collared one of the men, but the other two bolted.

The three men captured are ex-convicts and opium fiends, and the police expect to fasten the burglary of Ah Sam's house upon them. They are what the officers call "dead-hard mugs," and are the kind of citizens who are not wanted in Sacramento.

Two Peace Disturbers.

In the City Justice's Court yesterday, Edward Elger was convicted on a charge of disturbing the peace in a street car. He was fined \$10, which he paid.

W. Carey, charged with disturbing the peace in the City Hotel on K street, between Third and Fourth, was found guilty and fined \$25.00.

Several incidents of this character are said to have occurred there lately.

ROMANCE IN LOW LIFE.

Emma Hines, in a fit of jealousy, Attempts Suicide.

Emma Hines, who has for some time past been living with a man named William Landgraf, was taken to the Receiving Hospital about 9 o'clock last night with a bullet in her side. She had shot herself at the Brown House.

Dr. Ogden, Assistant City Physician, was summoned and worked for a long time trying to locate the bullet, which entered the side about the fifth rib, and seemed to glance along the rib. He was not able to locate it, however.

Landgraf claimed that the woman shot herself in the presence of him and Lena Oster, through jealousy, he having told her that he was going away and would not come back. She told the doctor that she was insisting that it was her own act.

Lena Oster stated that Emma said to Landgraf, "Kiss me, Billy." She was under the influence of liquor, and when he answered, "Wait till we get over to the house, and I will," she pulled the pistol and shot herself.

TWO SMALL FIRES.

One Was Accidental, the Other Probably Incendiary.

Shortly after noon yesterday a mattress in the basement of the Ebner Hotel on K street, between Front and Second, caught fire and was the occasion for a fire at the Fire Department.

The basement was filled with smoke and the firemen had some difficulty in locating the source from which it emanated. How the mattress caught fire is considerable a mystery. It was near a basement window from which the wire screening had been torn, and many people are inclined to believe it was the work of an incendiary.

A small sized blaze occurred in the residence of Thomas C. May, at 210 Q street, about 7:30 o'clock last evening, caused by the overturning of an oil lamp. The furniture was badly damaged by the flames and the stream of water turned on, but the fire was extinguished without trouble. The loss was nominal.

A SAD FATE.

Charles Wieger Ends His Life in Golden Gate Park.

A dispatch from San Francisco last evening contained the following account of the finding of the body of Charles Wieger in Golden Gate Park, where he had committed suicide by taking opium.

Upon the body were found three letters from Wieger's children addressed to him at the Golden West Hotel, where he usually stayed when in this city. They were the commonplace family letters.

On the back of the envelope of one of them Wieger wrote his last words. They were as follows: "God bless my darling children and farewell. The sun is almost down."

"Florence, Julius, Helene, Hermann and Vera—my five innocent darlings cannot help my myself. I have to go or else I will slip further down still. There is a pawn ticket in this book for the gold watch you can redeem within three months. Interest is 30 cents."

"A steady position is what I needed. I think I got bravely enough these last six months."

There was another paragraph in which Wieger bequeathed a curse on Philip Scheid of this city.

Wieger was once in business here, but failed and was convicted of defrauding Eastern houses by false statements as to his financial standing. He was severely criticised at one time for abandoning and failing to support his family. A few months ago he was employed by a mercantile firm in this city for a short time.

The man no man no doubt had led a very miserable life of late years, and being out of steady employment became so despondent that he could see no relief except through death.
