

SUNDAY'S FIRE AT JEROME, ARIZ.

One of the Greatest Calamities Ever Known in the Territory.

Within Two Hours Five Blocks of Property Were in Flames.

Eight Charred Bodies Reported to Have Been Taken From the Ruins—The Property Loss Estimated at Half a Million Dollars.

PRESCOTT (Ariz.), Sept. 12.—Yesterday's fire at Jerome was one of the greatest calamities that has ever occurred in the Territory.

It was nearly 7 o'clock when the first alarm was given, and the slumberers awoke to realize that a shock in the Italian quarter, near the Grand View Hotel, was being consumed by the fiery element.

The flames rapidly after the first alarm, the flames seemed to be more rapid, and spread, licking up building after building.

Eye-witnesses with whom we have talked state that it was a horrible panorama, and as the fire progressed, the flames seemed to be more rapid, and spread, licking up building after building.

Nothing was spared. Men and women who by years of industry and thrift had accumulated household goods and comforts for themselves saw all but their scanty apparel swept away.

Added to the loss of property and the fact that the once thrifty town is no more, that its 2,500 people are in most instances destitute, the grim reaper of death hovers over the scene of desolation, intensifying the frightful work of destruction.

destruction. Many men and children are missing. Eight charred bodies have thus far been discovered, and it is feared that possibly twice that number have perished in the holocaust.

The scenes enacted were pitiable in the extreme, particularly among the women, who, frenzied at the loss of all, watched with tears the destruction of their homes and household property.

The property loss is difficult to make an estimate. In cases, however, like the houses owned by the United Verde Company, numbering at least fifty, and having a valuation of \$2,000 each, the magnificent hospital building and general merchandise stores, saloons, hotels and other business houses, some idea may be had of the extent of the loss.
