SITUATION AT MANILA. DEWEY HAS NOT ASKED FOR ASSISTANCE.

Assures the Navy Department That He is Able to Take Care of Any Emergency That May Arise.

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—A special to the "Times" from Washington says: Despite the repeated denials of both the Army and Navy Departments, many papers continue publishing dispatches from this city stating that Admiral Dewey is asking for help, and that the Administration will send his assistance immediately two battleships. These reports are beginning to annoy the department officials as well as the President. There is no truth in them, according to Assistant Secretaries Allen and Melkjohn.

Admiral Dewey has not asked for aid at all any time. He has, on the other hand, repeatedly assured the Navy Department that there is no trouble to be feared in the Philippines, and that he and his squadron are quite able to take care of any emergency that may arise. Assistant Secretary Allen says that Dewey has been absolutely no truth in the report that the department is contemplating sending battleships or any ships at all to the Philippines to aid the Admiral.

"This department," he said, "has received but one dispatch from Dewey for several days. That dispatch came this morning, and gave us the startling information that Dewey had discovered that he could buy jerked beef in Manila, and could thus save the trouble and expense of a trip to Australia for the purpose of getting some of this food for his men. I think that if he was expecting trouble he would have said so in the cablegram. We are confident that he will communicate with the Navy Department rather than a casual newspaper correspondent in Manila whenever he gets into trouble and needs help from this Government. The entire story is false."

In conjunction with this story there became current to-day another to the effect that the Germans are lying about the vicinity of Manila; that Prince Heinrich and Admiral Diederich had been withdrawn from their warships, but are near by awaiting orders from the Kaiser as to the Philippines, or as much of the archipelago as the Iron Fist can grasp. It was also reported that Dewey had advised this Government that he expects trouble from the Germans and has appealed for assistance. This, too, is strenuously denied by both the War and Navy Departments, and the State Department has received no query at all from the hero of Manila. It communicates with him either through the Navy or War Department.

The story originated here and the navy officials have grown tired denying it daily in morning and afternoon papers.

One reason for the confidence felt by the War Department officials in a peaceable solution of the difficulties is their knowledge of the peculiar fitness of General Otis, the American commander, for the discharge of just such duties—diplomatic as well as military—as now confronts him. The officials are confident that if by discretion and judgment a clash with the insurgents can be averted without losing any of our advantages, General Otis may be safely trusted to exhibit these qualities.

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

AMUSEMENTS. There was a full house at the Orpheum last night to see the vespigic reproduction of the Corbett-Fitzsimmons contest. Among the spectators were many ladies. It is a very interesting and exciting exhibition. The pictures are life size and are accurate reproductions of the entire scene in the ring, from the entry of the officials to the end of the contest and the triumph of Fitzsimmons. W. R. Wheelock explained the pictures, round by round. Mr. Wheelock's remarks are entertaining and add much to the show, but his introductory speech is altogether too long, and the audience by manifest impatience gave him no to understand. In one respect the exhibition is especially interesting as showing the remarkable advance that has been made in instantaneous photography, and the wonderful strides which have been made in reproducing by the aid of the stereoscopic photographic views immensely enlarged and with such rapidity as to produce a stereoscopic illusion. That last night's audience thoroughly enjoyed the entertainment beyond question, as its manifestations of approval were emphatic and constant. As the contest proceeded the interest of the audience increased, until it grew to a degree of excitement up to the delivery of the celebrated solar plexus blow that decided the fight, when the defeated athlete struggled to the ropes and endeavored to raise himself to a renewal of the contest, but failed and was counted out, whereupon he breaks away from his seconds and rushes upon Fitzsimmons, who is taken unawares and is forced to the ropes and struck several times before the maddened Corbett can be secured. Mr. Wheelock, the lecturer, was asked a number of questions by spectators and courteously responded with explanations in each instance. The entertainment was a decided success throughout. It will be repeated to-night.

"The Battle of Manila" was repeated at Snowflake Park last night to a large audience. It was a greatly bettered show than that of the first night. Additional scenery had been mounted, for instance, the harbor of Cavite was shown for the first time, and the ex-

pllosion of the arsenal magazines at that point. Four times the amount of fireworks was used, with heavier artillery discharges, and many additional discharges of batteries of rockets and bombs. A new feature not ready on the first night, namely, the triple trapeze act by the three De Novos, daring and graceful aerial artists. Still other new features will be introduced to-night, and still more scenery will be mounted.
