TO-DAY'S RACES.

California Jockey Club's Meeting to Begin on Monday.

This afternoon will conclude the State Fair meeting, but there will be a two weeks' running meeting, commencing on Monday, under the management of the California Jockey Club of Oakland, of which Thomas H. Williams is President.

There are upward of 250 running horses now quartered at the park, and it is expected the meeting will be the best ever held on the coast outside of the Ingleside and Oakland tracks.

Mr. Williams is here to give his personal attention to the management of the meeting, and every one familiar with racing matters knows that Mr. Williams stands for the best in that branch of sport. Everything the California Jockey Club manages is conducted on a high plane, and race-goes may depend on being well treated.

Racing will begin each day at 2:30 o'clock, and there will be the usual number of events with good purses. Moreover, there will be competition in the pool business, as the field will be open to all bookmakers who may choose to cut in.

This will insure the giving of more liberal odds than where one firm has the monopoly. There are several bookmakers now in the city ready to put up their slates as soon as the gates open.
