Germany Plotting to Secure Control of the Islands.

Only for the Presence of the British Steamship Ringdove at Apia.

It is Believed the Germans Would Have Hoisted Their Flag Over the Islands on the Death of King Malletoa.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 21.—The steamship Alameda, from Sydney, Auckland, Apia and Honolulu, brought further particulars concerning the death of King Malletoa. The King's death was due to typhoid fever. He died on Monday, August 23d, and was buried on the 24th. A large number of natives and whites attended the funeral. Revs. S. J. E. Newell and J. Marnott, assisted by native pastors, conducted the funeral ceremonies.

PREMATURE SCARE.

A Constitutional Amendment That Has no Mare's Nest.

There seems to be considerable alarm in certain circles at the Capitol lest the proposed amendment to the Constitution passed at the last session of the Legislature and providing for a court of claims, should, if adopted at the polls, abolish the State Board of Examiners, and incidentally one or two other positions. The proposed amendment reads:

"The Court of Claims shall consist of any three Judges of the Superior Court, who may be requested by the Governor to hold court at the regular terms thereof. The Court of Claims shall have exclusive jurisdiction to hear and determine all claims of every kind and character against the State, under such laws as may be passed by the Legislature, and its judgment thereon shall be final."

There does not appear to be anything alarming in this. It provides that the Court of Claims shall have jurisdiction "under such laws as may be passed by the Legislature." It therefore lies with the Legislature to say what class of claims shall be submitted to the proposed tribunal.
