

NEW JERSEY REPUBLICANS.

Convened in State Convention at Trenton Yesterday.

United States Attorney General Griggs Presides Over the Gathering.

Defends the Course of the Administration in the War, the Happy Results of Which Brought Together the People of the North and the South.

TRENTON (N. J.), Sept. 22. — The Republican State Convention met here to-day and nominated Foster M. Voorhees as its candidate for Governor.

There was only one session of the convention, lasting about two hours, and the gathering was the most harmonious affair of the sort ever gotten together in New Jersey.

The convention was called to order in Taylor's Opera-house at noon to-day by Chairman Franklin Murphy of the State Central Committee.

Mr. Griggs received an ovation. He spoke briefly of local State politics in the last political campaign.

"And in this latest time of storm and stress, in the midst of great perplexity and under the weight of enormous responsibilities, it is a pleasant thing to bear witness that our President has retained the confidence and support of those who aided us in 1896.

Mr. Voorhees was nominated by acclamation, and as the Governor is the only State officer elected by the people the work of the convention was soon performed.

"I believe in the capacity of Americans to govern, to govern themselves and others. I believe that the boundless capacity and the splendid courage of America, with her high sense of justice, her appreciation of the rights of man, will in the new duties placed upon us work out marvels for the peoples that have come under our guardianship and greatest glory for our country.

"And how we have been blessed already. All the old root of bitterness between North and South has been removed. What years and years of political effort could not do, was done in a moment, when our standards were set toward a foreign foe and the consummation of fraternal harmony with Patrick Henry and Thomas Jefferson and the Pinckneys about our country's interest."

After the address of Attorney General Griggs, the convention decided to remain in continuous session. The Committee on Resolutions reported the single exception of the following sentence, which was stricken out on motion of Chairman Murphy:

"And, if by the misconduct or incompetency of any of these, their health or their lives have been unnecessarily sacrificed or endangered, we feel assured that the President and his constitutional advisers will make such investigation as will bring the offenders, regardless of past or present political affiliations, to punishment."

Mr. Murphy said that if there had been an fraternal harmony with Patrick Henry and Thomas Jefferson and the Pinckneys about our country's interest.

Congressman Rowler, in a speech, placed in nomination acting Governor Voorhees on October 24.

The convention adjourned at 2:40 o'clock.
