

FAST TIME AT LOUISVILLE TRACK.

Bingen Makes the Best Trotting Time of the Year.

Goes in the First Heat in Two Six and Three-Quarters.

John A. McKerron Also Lowers the Season's Record for Three-Year-Old Trotters—Searchlight an Easy Winner in Straight Heats in the Commercial Club Pacing Stakes.

LOUISVILLE (Ky.), Sept. 26.—The fastest heat of the year was trotted in the opening heat of the Louisville Driving Association meet, when Bingen won the first heat of the 2:11 trot in 2:06 3/4. The weather was perfect and the track had been worked into splendid condition. John A. McKerron won the first heat of the Preparation Stake in 2:12 3/4, which is the season's record for three-year-olds, while Caid made the second heat of the 2:11 trot in 2:07 3/4, equalling Eagle Flanagan's previous record made at Terre Haute last week. In this race the winner of each heat lowered its previous record.

admirers' hopes by taking the second heat, but Captum, Marcus Daly's Montana colt, proved a surprise, and won the third and fourth heats and the race easily, with Herr second.

The race of the day, the 2:11 trot, was a comparatively easy win for Bingen, the Hamlin entry. Tommy Bingen, driven by Geers, who opened favorite, was never in it. Caid won the second and third heats, but Bingen took the fourth. Bingen, Caid and George Anna were the only starters in the last heat, and Bingen won with lengths to spare.

Searchlight, the California horse, was out of the betting in the 2:00 pace and won in straight heats. The chief event to-morrow will be the Douglas stakes, \$5,000, for 2:14 trotters, which will bring together one of the best fields of the year. 

COMMERCIAL. SPOT WHEAT UNCHANGED—FUTURES FAVOR LOWER.

Spot Wheat is unchanged; futures opened lower; early advices from Chicago favor the generally unsettled feeling, but the market subsequently improved. BLANCO'S CHANGE OF HEART. Authorized Free Entry of Vessels Carrying Relief Supplies.

HAVANA, Sept. 26.—General Blanco has authorized the free entry of the Comal and other vessels bringing supplies for the relief of the sufferers in Cuba. ORDINANCE NO. 445. An Ordinance Prohibiting the Keeping of Cows in Greater Number than Two Within Certain Limits of the City of Sacramento and Fixing a Penalty for the Violation of this Ordinance.

Section 1. No cow exceeding two in number, shall be kept or maintained by any person or family or firm, within the limits of the city of Sacramento, to wit: South of B street, and north of R street, and west of Twenty-third street, in said city.

ORDINANCE NO. 446. An Ordinance Providing for Fire Escapes on Buildings in the City of Sacramento.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, as owner, agent, contractor, lessee or employee, to build, construct or maintain any building of three stories or more in height in the city of Sacramento, and occupied or used as a hotel, boarding or lodging house, tenement, dwelling, or for offices or sleeping apartments, or for factories, mills, manufactories or workshop, unless the same be provided with good and sufficient means of egress in case of fire.

ORDINANCE NO. 447. An Ordinance to amend Section Seven of Ordinance Number One Hundred and Forty-one, regulating the time for using City water for the purposes of irrigation in the City of Sacramento, and providing that fire pressure be maintained by the City Water Works during said time.

Section 1. Section seven of ordinance number one hundred and forty-one is hereby amended to read as follows: Section 7. No person or persons shall use, or cause to be used, any City water for the purposes of irrigation in the City of Sacramento, except between the hours from Five to Eight o'clock a. m., and from Five to Nine o'clock p. m., except at the City Cemetery, State Capitol Grounds, Federal Building and the Plaza. And it is further provided that during the foregoing hours fixed for irrigation, the City Water Works, and the Chief Engineer thereof, shall maintain fire pressure throughout said City.

ORDINANCE NO. 448. An Ordinance to amend Section Seven of Ordinance Number One Hundred and Forty-one, regulating the time for using City water for the purposes of irrigation in the City of Sacramento, and providing that fire pressure be maintained by the City Water Works during said time.

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ORDINANCE NO. 449. An Ordinance Making the Willful Non-Payment of Just Debts a Cause for the Dismissal and Removal of Eminent and Appointees of the City of Sacramento.

Section 1. The willful failure or neglect of any employe or appointee of the City of Sacramento to pay his just debts or obligations contracted while such employe or appointee, is hereby made a cause for the dismissal and removal from the service of the city of said employe or appointee.
