



PEACE COMMISSIONERS.

FRENCH SYMPATHY WITH THE SPANISH.

While Americans Were Cordially Received, Paris Not Inclined Toward United States.

PARIS, Sept. 27.-While the reception accorded the United States Peace Commission is all that could be desired, and while the French Foreign Office has taken great pains to treat the American and Spanish Commissioners in precisely the same manner, it must be admitted that the general atmosphere of Paris, especially the diplomatic atmosphere, does not incline toward America.

It is the general impression here that the American Commissioners have instructions to provide for the retention of Manila and the island of Luzon, "and for the commission to pretend to negotiate in a farce," said a prominent diplomat. He continued: "America will put herself, diplomatically, in the wrong when she exceeds the provisions of the protocol which both nations signed. I know the Spaniards have come to make concessions, but if the Americans' instructions are of an uncompromising nature, which is generally believed here to be the case, you can rest assured that the work of the commission will be futile. The Spaniards will retire, and America will at least have to threaten a resumption of hostilities before she will gain her point."

The French newspapers, beyond announcing the arrival of the commissions, make no comment upon the matter. The American Peace Commission, for the first time since its appointment, met to-day as a body for two hours in the drawing-room of the Continental Hotel.

Ferdinand W. Peck, the United States Commissioner to the Paris Exposition of 1900, is about to vacate his quarters in the same hotel. They were formerly occupied by the ex-Empress Eugenie and have been used by Mr. Peck as offices until the permanent offices on the exposition grounds were in readiness.

The suite of rooms which the former Empress at one time used will probably be acquired by the American Peace Commissioners. They will be used for executive sessions and official headquarters.

As the joint commission is not a deliberative body, it will, possibly, not organize with a presiding member from either commission. This is deemed in some quarters to be the wiser plan, as tending to promote closer working relations between the two commissions and facilitating an ultimate adjustment. This, however, is not positive.

Judge Day and Whitelaw Reid are quartered at a hotel overlooking the Tuilleries gardens and the other Commissioners are equally comfortable. The Americans enjoyed sunny weather during their first day in Paris, and they are all in good health and spirits. The French Government is arranging to provide at the salon where the joint sessions of the commissions will be held an elaborate buffet daily for the use of all the Commissioners.

CABINET MEETING.

No Questions of Special Importance Came Up for Discussion.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.-There were no questions of special importance before the Cabinet meeting to-day. The work of the War Investigating Commission was informally discussed, all of the members heartily approving the President's address to the Commissioners last Saturday, in which he charged them with the duty of making the inquiry searching and exhaustive, and pledged them his assistance in procuring evidence from all sources.

The approaching arrival here of Agoncillo, the representative of the Philippine insurgent leader, Aguinaldo, was alluded to, the President stating that he would gladly hear what he had to say, but under no circumstances would he receive him in any official capacity. If he was granted an interview with the President, it would be only as a private citizen of the Philippines.

ASPXYIATED.

A Mother and Her Daughter Found Dead at Milwaukee.

MILWAUKEE (Wis.), Sept. 27.-Mrs. Rose Sanger, sister of Optician Julius Land of this city, and her young daughter, Aronica, residing at 815 Newhall street, were found dead in their sleeping room early this morning. The tragedy is thought to have occurred Sunday night. Neighbors and relatives becoming alarmed at their non-appearance, forced an entrance to their apartments. The cock on the gas jet was found to be partly open. It is thought Mrs. Sanger had accidentally left the gas partly turned on retiring for the night. The Coroner will investigate.

SEIZURE OF THE ABBEY.

Dewey's Action Meets With Approval of Navy Department.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.-The official account of the seizure by Admiral Dewey of the filibustering steamer Abbey, as reported in the press dispatches, is contained in the following cablegram received from the Admiral to-day at the Navy Department: "Manila, Sept. 27.-Having received information that the American steamer Abbey left Macal September 21st with a cargo of arms for Batangas, I sent the McCulloch. She arrived at Batangas on the 23d, and found her in the harbor, having arrived three days earlier, and landed her cargo. There were only Filipinos on board. They refused to give any information, and had no papers whatever. Seized and brought her here, where we are now holding her. This steamer was formerly the Paieg, and is registered as an American vessel. The United States Consul at Canton has information that she has made one voyage of the same kind already. DEWEY."

PEKIN, Sept. 27.-An imperial edict issued to-day practically rescinds the recent reformatory edicts, and orders that Chang Yen Hwan, the former member of the Chinese Foreign Office, and opponent of Li Hung Chang, be confined until further notice. THE TRAIN WAS IN TWO SECTIONS. THE FIRST CARRIED A PORTION OF THE REGIMENT ON ROUTE TO FORT RUSSELL, WYO. THE SECOND SECTION HAD THE REMAINDER OF THE REGIMENT BOUND FOR FORT DOUGLAS, UTAH. MAJOR MARKLEY, WHO COMMANDED THE REGIMENT AT SANTIAGO, WAS ON THIS SECTION.

THE MEN, ONE AND ALL, CLAIMED THEY WERE BEING EXCELLENTLY TREATED BY THE GOVERNMENT, AND ALWAYS HAD BEEN. A NUMBER OF THOSE WOUNDED AT SANTIAGO, WHO HAD RECOVERED, WERE ON THE TRAINS.


