ABSURD STORIES.

Two odd yarns come by wire from Havana. One is that on opening the tomb of Columbus, it was discovered that the coins and valuables in it, and part of the bones of the great voyager, have been stolen.

Still another story is that the removal was merely pretended and not actual, as our Government had objected and therefore the farce was played of removal to satisfy the demands of radical Spaniards.

The rumor of the murder of Toral is without confirmation—indeed, this is the first news of it had, and it is probably a fake.

That this Government ever objected to the removal of the bones of Columbus from Havana is absurd. It has done nothing of the kind nor will it do so, since the United States cares nothing about the matter, and since also there is serious doubt whether the bones of Columbus were ever brought to Havana.

The death of Thomas F. Bayard removes from among American statesmen a foremost figure. Differing from Mr. Bayard in most of his political beliefs, the "Record-Union" can nevertheless sincerely pay his memory the tribute of admiration for his high ability, and his strong and manly character.

GOVERNING IN THE ORIENT.

It is objected by some who oppose retention of the Philippines that we could not police the islands without sacrificing thousands of lives of our soldiers, as the Philippine population is dense, largely Malay, ignorant in large part, savage in many islands, scattered over vast territory, and not at all acquainted with our manners or methods.

But those who raise these objections proceed upon the assumption that to hold the islands we would have to establish a government like that of our own country, and call to its administration Americans backed by armed forces.

Such a government would win the

people to it by natural law and force. Human beings everywhere are liberty loving in some degree. Everywhere men prefer to control their government rather than to be ruled over.

As to policing the islands under such a form of government as will be local and self-administering, the police force to be employed would be most largely native. All nations in their colonial policy adopt that system.

Ours is a case in which everything would favor using the people themselves for their own good. We could do this the more effectively because the free system of government wins men to it by its own force.

Representative Hull of Iowa, Chairman of the Republican Executive Committee, is reported to have said that the election of a Democratic Congress this fall would be a triumph for Europe.

The Republican ticket for Sacramento County bears the name of Frank T. Johnson for Sheriff. Mr. Johnson has in every position he has filled been an efficient and energetic official.

Lieutenant Hobson has added another leaf to his laurel chaplet. He has successfully raised the armored cruiser Maria Theresa, and towed her into Guantanamo Bay where she is being repaired preparatory to her trip to a navy yard, where she will be restored to her original strength and serviceability.

Ten thousand and sixty-six persons died in Matanzas, Cuba, between January 1st and September 1, 1898. Of these eighty per cent, say the doctors' certificates, died of starvation and nothing else.

The Spanish, under the mask of the colonial government, are turning loose in Cuba the most dangerous criminals, pardoning them and setting them free upon the Cuban community by the hundreds weekly.

MRS. MARY TEATS' LECTURE.

SHE TALKS ON TEMPERANCE AND PURITY.

Says Licentiousness Has Been King of Sin for Six Thousand Years.

Mrs. Mary Teats, of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, conducted a temperance prayer-meeting yesterday afternoon at the Sixth-street Methodist Church, and afterwards spoke to those assembled upon the subjects of temperance and the purity work in which she is engaged.

Mrs. Teats said that she had forgotten what her subject was to be, but she wished to speak of whatever would most interest her hearers in the work of the W. C. T. U., it being "Wide Day." She hoped they would all pray that she might have the leading of the spirit.

There is a great field ahead on the subject of purity. She found that there are many men and women that she could interest in the purity work, whom she could not interest in the temperance work. The ground taken in this work regarding purity in the marital relations may seem too advanced and strict to many, but it is being taken up and advocated by foremost scientists and educational leaders.

The terrible mortality in infantile ages is due to the abuse of God's laws. No mother can give her best to the little child just toddling by her side while she has another in her arms. The mother has robbed the children and the children have robbed the mother.

The meeting resolved itself into a free parliament, to discuss the various phases of the purity question. In answer to a question Mrs. Teats said she knew of a case where a teething child was thrown into convulsions and died from the effect of the fumes of tobacco smoke, the father being a confirmed smoker and the rooms saturated with tobacco smoke.

In the evening Mrs. Teats spoke on the subject, "Women Constantly Torment Us." At 2:30 p. m. to-day Mrs. Teats will lecture in the English Lutheran Church on Sixteenth street, and at 7:45 this evening. At 2 p. m. on Saturday she will lecture in the Congregational Church to young ladies.

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
