

SHOT HIS WIFE TWICE.

Thomas Harrison's jealous deed yesterday. Then Slashed His Own Throat With a Razor—Both Still Alive.

Thomas Harrison, who lives on the Monte Vista tract, near the County Hospital, early yesterday morning shot his wife twice and then cut his throat with a razor, severing the windpipe. His wife is in a very precarious condition, but he may recover.

Harrison has been insanely jealous of his wife for some time, and last summer she commenced suit for divorce from him, but dismissed it shortly after at his solicitor's advice.

Harrison evidently intended to kill both his wife and his two children, for he had nailed up all the windows and locked all the doors, taking the keys out of all except one, and to the latter circumstance Mrs. Harrison owes her life.

He shot her in the arm near the elbow and also through the lung, and after the last shot she staggered to her feet and made her escape through the front door, in which the key had been left.

He and his wife were both taken to the County Hospital, where their wounds were dressed by Dr. White. The superintendent then resting as easily as possible last night.

Harrison some time ago employed a detective to watch his wife and secure evidence of her unfaithfulness, and the detective told him after investigation that he had no reason to doubt her.
