

BACK IN 1853.

What a Daily Paper Contained in Those Days. A recent fire destroyed many valuable articles in the residence of the late Governor Booth.

There was a bathhouse at the foot of I street where filtered water could be had, and the "prison-brig" was anchored in the middle of the river. A. P. Catlin was a director in the Sacramento Valley Railroad Co. The Uncle Sam and the Yankee Blade were advertised to convey passengers via Isthmus to New York within twenty-one days. Prices of materials were high; thus, rough lumber, \$50 per thousand; bricks, \$12 per thousand; flour, 7 cents; anthracite coal, \$45 per ton; sugar, 12c. In one column appears the announcement that coffee sold at 20 cents and beans at 8 cents. In another column is a quotation from a Stockton paper saying "coffee has advanced but beans stand as formerly quoted," which might imply a substitution of the one for the other!

The mails arrived twice each month from "home" and the paper records that "last night a long line was formed on the sidewalk at the Postoffice of persons anxiously seeking, with bounding hearts, for letters and intelligence of friends far away."

It is also recorded that "John Van Buren has wisely said that the Constitution provides for the surrender of a fugitive slave."

Salt Lake City is described as a collection of small farms and adobe walls, but the immigration was less than usual and that not more than 1,400 wagons had passed through to Oregon.

SUPREME COURT DECISIONS.

SYLLABI. (S. F., No. 1441—In Bank—Filed October 4, 1898.) Albert I. Anderson and Charles W. Albert, Petitioners; Superior Court of Lassen County, respondent. Probation, Write issue.

The conditions upon which a prohibition may be forced into insolvency and his property sequestrated for the benefit of his creditors are prescribed by the statute and may not be disregarded. One condition is that five creditors shall unite in the petition and that they shall hold claims to the amount of \$500. It was not intended that less than five bona fide creditors or creditors in a less amount than \$500 should set this proceeding in motion and afterward drum up the requisite number and amount to sustain the jurisdiction. There is nothing in the language of the statute to support the contention that a defect of this character can be cured by amendment.

It is true the petition may be amended, but the language of the Act is: "The petitioners may from time to time amend and correct the petition so that the same shall conform to the facts," etc. (Stats. 1895, p. 134.) This means nothing more than it says, i. e., that the original petitioners may amend to correct their allegations as to acts of insolvency and the particulars of their own claims—not that they may hunt up and bring in new creditors to set up new claims.

(S. F., No. 683—In Bank—Filed October 4, 1898.) M. W. Fox, respondent; Hale & Norcross Silver Mining Company et al., appellants. Damages. Modified.

The court does not reverse a judgment or direct a new trial, if it is able from the record to determine the rights of the parties, but will itself make a final determination of these rights by a correction or modification of the judgment. Under its authority to modify any judgment or order appealed from, whenever it is shown, either by the record on appeal or by the admission or consent of the parties, that their rights can be finally determined in the appellate court, that court will render its own judgment to that effect or will direct such action in the court below as will best conserve the rights of the parties to the action, without subjecting them to further delay or expense.

This rule is followed, whether the error is found upon an examination of the record or appears upon the face of the judgment, or is confessed by the respondent or when the respondent asks for or consents to a modification.

And when upon appeal from a judgment the respondent releases the appellant from that portion of the damages claimed in the action which is involved in fact, and withdraws from consideration by the court his right to a judgment upon his claim for such damages, it is proper to direct the court below to modify the judgment appealed from in accordance with such stipulation.

The prevailing party is entitled to costs incurred by him, whether his recovery be for the whole or a portion of his claim, or whether his claim be made up of one or several causes of action. The only limitation is that he shall recover \$300 or over.

(Crim. No. 371—In Bank—Filed October 5, 1898.) People, respondent; Manuel Fellows, appellant. Murder. Reversed.

Section 4192 of the Political Code provides that a process and order in an action or proceeding may be executed by a person residing in the county designated by the court, the Judge thereof or a County Judge, and denominated in ellipsis, in the following cases: (1) When the Sheriff and Coroner are both parties; (2) when either of these officers is a party and there is a vacancy in the office of the other, or when it appears by affidavit to the satisfaction of the court in which the proceeding is pending, or the Judge thereof, that both these officers are disqualified, or by reason of bias, prejudice or other cause, would not act promptly or impartially. Again, Section 226, C. C. P., provides: "Whenever jurors are not drawn or summoned to attend any court of record or session thereof, or a sufficient number of jurors appear, such court may order a sufficient number to be forthwith drawn and summoned to attend the court, or it may by an order entered in its minutes direct the Sheriff or an elisor chosen by the court to summon so many good and lawful men of the county."

Held, that the codes are to be construed as one statute (Pol. C. Sec. 4180), and so construing these provisions it is clear that the Political Code limits and defines the power of a court in appointing an elisor, and enumerates the circumstances under which such appointment is permissible. When the Sheriff is disqualified the duty in the first instance is always cast upon the Coroner. When both are disqualified, then only may an elisor be nominated. This is not a departure from the strict adherence to the rule of common law.

The same reasons which forbid the Sheriff to summon jurors when he is biased should forbid his being entrusted with the care of such jury when it is necessary to deliberate. See People vs. Ebanks, 117 Cal. 652. Upon the subject of intoxication as an excuse for crime, see People vs. Lewis, 36 Cal. 531. The instructions, "Intoxication produced by intoxication does not destroy responsibility where the party when sane and responsible made himself voluntarily intoxicated," and "While mere voluntary intoxication is no excuse or justification for the commission of a crime, still insanity, although produced immediately by intoxication, is a defense," are contradictory and confusing. The first is absolutely correct.

PRODUCTIVE CAPACITY. Wonderful Variety of Resources in Cuba.

There is wonderful variety of resources in Cuba. Almost all the metals applicable to industry are found in the island—gold, silver, iron, copper, quicksilver, lead, asphaltum, arsenic, copra, alum, salt, ochre, etc. Coal that is fit for combustion is not found. Nature, in the distribution of needs, saw little use for coal in a country where the average temperature is 71 degrees and the minimum temperature is 30 degrees. Marble and Jasper of very fine quality are found in many places. Immense deposits of pure white sand borders the beautiful colored or pure white marble quarries. This sand is used with cement in the construction of buildings. In forestry Cuba is rich. Wood almost as hard as iron and practically imperishable makes the island rich in quality, if not in quantity. Lignum

vitae, ebony, rosewood, mahogany and other costly woods are abundant. The fruits are those common to the tropics. The pineapple is indigenous, and the banana requires little or no attention. There are no wild animals and no birds of prey, and none were ever known to exist on the island, except Weyler and his cohorts. Turtles, fish and oysters flourish; in fact, nature apparently favored Cuba with a lavish bestowal of good things.

But it is in wealth to be obtained from tillage of the soil that Cuba is very great. The ground is covered with secondary and tertiary formations, and in the compact and cavernous layers are contained ferruginous veins, and the red earth so common in Cuba. The central part contains calcareous formations of clay and limestone. The common mind can hardly grasp the importance of this, but can appreciate the wealth in fact, and the capacity. In Cuba there are sections of land containing thirty-three acres called caballeria. A caballeria of land will produce on an average the following crops:

Table listing agricultural products and their values: Sugar, lbs. 75,000; Tobacco, lbs. 9,000; Cotton, lbs. 2,000; Cocoa, lbs. 2,000; Coffee, lbs. 12,500; Indigo, lbs. 1,500; Rice, lbs. 20,000; Yucca, lbs. 20,000; Bananas, bunches, 2,000.

And yet, only a small proportion of the land is actually cultivated. Industry has been pursued in most indolent and slovenly ways. Cuba could furnish one-tenth of the world's need of cotton. Of tobacco she could furnish nearly twice as much as was raised in the United States in 1897. As to sugars, the productive capacity could scarcely be estimated—so vast is it; and rice might be grown to enormous extent.

Even more, perhaps, could be said for the productive capacity of the Philippine Islands, because of their much greater extent. If we keep the great islands we have occupied in the East and West Indies we shall, within no long period, organize their production on a basis that will go far toward revolutionizing some of the world's markets—Portland Oregonian.
