SECOND DAY'S SESSION OF W. C. T. U. CONVENTION.

Constitution Amended Making Department Superintendents Members of Executive Committee.

ST. PAUL (Minn.), Nov. 12.—The W. C. T. U. Convention opened to-day with prayer by Mrs. Mary Read Goddard, President of the union of Louisiana.

Miss Winnie Minear-English, National Superintendent of the work among miners, presented the ninth annual report of her department, briefly sketching work in twenty-five States, which included the distribution of over one million pages of literature.

She says: "The strikes have paralyzed the work in some States, particularly in Illinois. Because of this disturbance there is much suffering and much destitution."

"The hour of crusade memories" having arrived, the original crusaders present were invited to the platform, over twenty coming forward, and after prayer while still kneeling, sang the crusaders' hymn, which they sang twenty-five years ago when closing many saloons by that form of persuasion.

Miss Elizabeth W. Greenwood of New York presided, and introduced several other crusaders, who briefly told of incidents of their experiences in the crusade in California, Ohio, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Wisconsin and Nebraska.

Miss Anna Gordon announced her check for \$25 to make Mother Thompson, the first Ohio crusader, a life member of the W. C. T. U., and urged that like action be taken regarding all the original crusaders, and in a wave of enthusiasm Mrs. Henrietta Monroe, Miss Jennie Fowler Willinz, Mother Wallace of Indiana, Mother Stewart of Ohio, Amanda Smith, the colored evangelist; Mrs. Thurman, National Superintendent of Colored Work; Mrs. Esther McNeill of New York; Mrs. D. H. Wendell of New Hampshire, Miss Anna Gordon, Miss Fanny F. Francis of Kansas, Mrs. L. S. Rounds, President of the Illinois Union, Mrs. Helen M. Stoddard of Texas, Mrs. Helen M. Dye, Mrs. Esther House of Vermont, the Presidents of North Dakota, Indiana, Minnesota, New York, Missouri, Iowa, Kentucky and many others were made life members, thirty-six in number.

The noonday prayer time was given to sentence prayers by the crusaders. During the dinner hour rallies by the young women, known as the "Ys," the Superintendents and other branches of the work were held, but the afternoon session was called to order soon after 2 o'clock. Fraternal and visiting delegates and guests were then introduced and spoke briefly, among them being Mrs. and Mrs. T. P. Porter of England, Mrs. Lizzie Hill Mills of California, H. Tansu, a Japanese member of the Moody Bible School, and others.

The proposed amendments to the constitution were then taken up, looking to the making of the Department Superintendents regular members of the Executive Committee, and was carried by a strong vote, ending one of the longest fights in the organization.

The second amendment, to add the Board of Organizers to the Executive Committee, was lost—63 to 127. The third amendment making lectures and evangelists members of the convention was adopted without opposition.

The evening session was given over to the "Ys" for a welcome to the convention. The announcement of the awarding of the banners closed the evening. New York got the banner for the greatest increase in numbers, having increased 255, while Indiana took that for largest percentage of increase, having gained 200 per cent.

ADMIRAL DEWEY HONORED.

Chicago Board of Education Names a School After Him.

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—Admiral Dewey has acknowledged the compliment paid to him by the Chicago Board of Education in naming the new school "The George Dewey School" and in putting aside a day to be known as "Dewey Day."

"Will you have the kindness to extend to the Board of Education my heartfelt thanks for such an honor and say that I shall ever appreciate it."

"I greatly regret that it is not in my power to comply with the request for a large-sized photograph of myself, as I have not one single photograph left. But I shall have some taken on my return to the United States, if not earlier, and it will afford me much pleasure to send one to the Dewey School. Sincerely, GEORGE DEWEY."

The Dewey School is in the course of erection at the corner of Fifty-fourth street and Union avenue. By a resolution, introduced by Trustee Sherwood, the first school day in May is set apart for Dewey Day.

VERDIN STRIKE.

Differences Between the Coal Company and Miners Settled.

CARLINVILLE (Ill.), Nov. 12.—The differences between the Chicago-Virden Coal Company at Virden and Auburn and the striking miners have been settled, and the shafts will soon be in operation.

The company agreed to pay the State scale of 40 cents per ton, but did not want to tear down the stockade. Finally the company accepted the offer of the miners that they would take it down, and charge the company nothing for their labor.

Adjutant General Reese of Springfield notified Sheriff Davenport that the remaining troops guarding the Chicago-Virden Coal Company's shaft at Virden would be removed to-day, and asked him to send a number of deputies there to guard the plant when the soldiers left. Sheriff Davenport requested the Adjutant General to keep the troops there until Sunday, as he would be better able to cope with the situation. Wheat Crop of Russia and Hungary

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Statistician Hyde of the Agricultural Department has completed the official statistics of the crops of the world for this month, and a revised review of the world's wheat is an important feature. Thus, the Russian wheat crop is now put by the Minister of Agriculture at 117,000,000 Winchester bushels, an increase of 30,000,000 bushels over the Hungarian official estimate. An estimate believed to be below rather than above the actual yield is credited to the Hungarian Agricultural Minister, estimating the Hungarian wheat crop at 132,277,000 bushels of sixty pounds.


