RECORD OF AN HOUR.

Two Chinamen Burned to Death and Another Stabbed. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 21.—Two Chinamen burned to death, another seriously if not fatally stabbed, and three policemen slightly wounded—this, in addition to the partial destruction of a three-story building by fire, was the record made within a single hour in Chinatown to-night.

A fire alarm was turned in shortly before 8 o'clock. The three-story brick building at 22 and 24 Waverly Place was on fire, and before the engines could reach it the interior was destroyed. The building swarmed with Chinese. A rush was made for the open air, but two failed to escape, and their charred bodies were found in the ruins after the flames had been extinguished. They were Wong Do Quay, the son of the proprietor of a store in the building, and Wong Gow, who recently came to San Francisco from Idaho.

While the fire was still in progress Chay, who occupied the basement, rushed from the burning building. Drawing a large knife, he ran amuck through the crowd that had assembled. As he did so it was observed that the long blade and handle of the knife were covered with blood, presumably from wounds which he had inflicted on himself. He made a pass at Special Officer Sellinger, who barely escaped injury. A group of policemen was standing near, and upon them he fell, cutting Officers Knight, Galloway and Herrison about the hands.
