

LOAM FOR P STREET PLAZA.

IT WILL HAVE TO WAIT UNTIL JANUARY.

Cost of Lighting City Departments Found to be Less Than Last Year.

The City Board of Trustees met in weekly session last night, Trustees McKay, Kent, Brown, Bentley, Devine, Faine, Dolan and Tebbets being present.

A message was received from the Mayor, appointing George Henry Kunz special policeman for the cemetery, vice self, time expired.

The City Auditor was instructed to transfer from the general fund \$300 to the street fund, \$175 to the sprinkling fund, and \$300 to the sewer fund.

A resolution empowering the Chief Engineer of the fire department and the Chairman of the Fire Committee to purchase a team of horses for the department at a cost not to exceed \$500 was adopted as an emergency.

Trustee Devine called attention to the dangerous condition of the Twelfth-street bridge.

Trustee Tebbets said that over no bridge leading from Sacramento does so much travel with heavy teams.

Trustee Devine thought it should be procured more cheaply. He authorized that the Street Committee be moved to purchase the loam at a price not to exceed 35 cents, and as much lower as possible.

Trustee Brown thought care should be exercised in selecting earth for filling the plaza, and that the plaza should be plowed before being filled in.

Trustee Paine said that the loam from the Thirteenth-street sewer could be furnished for the plaza at Fifteenth and P streets for 45 cents a yard, and would be better than the sand from the river.

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Trustee Devine withdrew his motion, and the matter went over till January.

LICENSING RUNNERS.

The ordinance relating to runners for restaurants, lodging-houses, etc., and the license to be imposed on them, was read.

Trustee Devine opposed the ordinance, as it seemed to be aimed at poor people who might be trying to make a living by running a lodging-house.

Trustee Dolan thought there should be no distinction between runners for hotels and those who pay \$10 a quarter.

Mayor Land was called on for his opinion and said he thought the ordinance a just one.

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COST OF LIGHTING. Clerk Desmond read the report of the Water Committee on the cost of lighting the Water Works, which showed that, with five more lights the cost is less than it was last year.

Trustee Devine moved that the Water Committee be instructed to ascertain the difference in the cost of lighting the Water Works, and to private parties.

The Chief Engineer's report showed that it cost less this year than last for lighting the Fire Department, and it was referred to the Fire Committee.

The board then adjourned.

HELD TO ANSWER.

George Ray Must Stand Trial in the Superior Court.

The examination of George Ray, charged with assaulting and intending to commit murder by shooting at Bert Turner, was held by Justice Davis yesterday in the City Justice's Court.

Bert Turner testified that on Thanksgiving day afternoon he was at the northeast corner of Fourth and L streets, where Ray nearly drove over him.

Ray came round the corner in a buggy and pulled out a pistol and pointed it toward him. He did not shoot, however, but drove off about a block.

He then turned around and drove back, and, handling the lines to his companion, pulled out the pistol again and holding it with both hands, fired at witness.

He tried to fire again, but a man named Banks grabbed his arm. They had had some words before on that day at the corner of Third and J streets, where Ray nearly drove over him.

Ray called him a liar, and he punched Ray in the mouth and the latter drove away.

W. S. Banks testified to the same state of facts. He took the pistol from Ray, and had it with him now.

H. J. Winters corroborated the circumstances of the shooting.

Gus Johnson testified that he was in the buggy with Ray when the shooting was done, and that Turner picked up a brick or stone after the shot and started for the buggy.

It was getting too hot for witness, and he slid out of the buggy and got away.

Isaac Williams testified that on that afternoon Ray showed him a pistol and said Turner had struck him, and he was going to get Turner and Banks.

Ray was held to answer before the Superior Court, with bonds fixed at \$2,000.

FIRE AT OAK PARK.

R. E. Looney and Wife Escape With Only What They Had On.

About 5 o'clock yesterday morning R. E. Looney, who is employed by the street railway company, and who lives in a house owned by Charles Pary in Oak Park, at that word was thirty-second and Y streets, the city was extended out that far, was preparing to get his breakfast, before going to work.

His brother had built a fire in the stove, and a few minutes afterward called to him that flames were bursting through the roof.

They tried to extinguish the flames, which almost immediately filled the kitchen with smoke, but were unable to do so, and with Mrs. Looney, who had been awakened, had barely time to get out of the house, losing everything.

The fire must have caught from a defective flue, and Mr. Looney thinks that it must have been smoldering through the night and broke through the roof about the time the fire was started in the morning.

His furniture, etc., was insured for only \$300. The house, which was a two-story one, was insured for \$1,500.
