

SUPREME COURT DECISIONS.

SYLLABI. (Sac. No. 147—In Bank—Filed December 16, 1898.)

William H. Smith, respondent; William Williams, appellant; Jacob Temple, appellant. Action for injunction against diversion of water. Affirmed.

Where the findings are justified by the evidence they will not be disturbed upon appeal.

(S. F. No. 938—Department One—Filed December 16, 1898.)

Marion J. McDonald, appellant; Mayor and Common Council of city of Placerville, respondent. Suit on judgment. Affirmed.

Where a plaintiff demands relief in addition to the recovery of money due on a judgment, he is bound to prove the provision of the statute allowing judgment by default in actions arising on contract for recovery of money or damages only.

(S. F. No. 941—Department One—Filed December 16, 1898.)

George F. Gray et al., appellants; George L. Richardson, respondent. Mandate to compel Street Superintendent of San Rafael to issue assessment for street work done. Affirmed.

Under the provisions of section 9 of the Street Improvement Act, the right to a second assessment does not exist unless it appear by the final judgment in a suit upon the prior assessment that the suit was defeated by reason of some infirmity in the assessment, or in the recording thereof, or in some matter connected with the return of the warrant.

Where a defect or infirmity in any other step taken in the proceedings, or by reason of a lack of evidence, or failure to prove any other fact essential to a recovery, the statute does not apply.

Make it a Merry Christmas. Let us not altogether overthrow the Santa Claus myth, for an immense moral influence dwells in it. The belief, which is general among the children, that his favor depends upon their good behavior, has an unequalled soothing power over rebellious dispositions. If they believe that the wise saint has his own recording angel, is there any harm in the quaint superstition? We should not encourage silly ideas. No restraint upon conduct is of any account unless we succeed in getting the child to want to be good. He will then try to be good unperceived. Faith and desire disappear under his eyes as well as he is in our sight.—Harper's Bazar.
