

SUPERVISOR GILLIS SEATED.

JOHN DREMAN RESISTED TO THE LAST.

High Sheriff Johnson Gently Led Him Outside the Chained Circle.

The large crowd that assembled in the Supervisors' room yesterday morning with the expectation of witnessing a scene of unusual interest, with the possibility of something of the melodramatic order taking place, were disappointed. Nothing better than a very commonplace farce-comedy resulted in the contest over the seat occupied by John Dremman of the First District.

Mr. Baker replied that the board has no right to go behind the election returns. Leaving aside the question as to the legality of Mr. Gillis' official bond, on the face of the matter he was entitled to the seat.

Chairman Curtis then called on Mr. Dremman to vacate the seat occupied by him. Mr. Dremman replied that he would not vacate the seat until removed by force.

On call of the roll Morrison and Jenkins declined to vote without a written opinion from the District Attorney as to their right to eject Dremman, but by the votes of McLaughlin, Curtis and Gillis the motion was carried.

Sheriff Johnson announced himself as ready to carry out the orders of the board, to which Attorney Morrison made response that they would hold him responsible for his acts and for any usurpation of his authority.

The chair vacated. The staid Sheriff smiled, threw out his chest, and remarking that he was prepared to meet any question of responsibility, began to move on the floor by Dremman. As he laid his hand gently on Dremman's arm Attorney Jones advised the latter to yield to the Sheriff, saying:
