during the session, would prefer bills relating to her own interests referred to her own delegation for consideration.

Brown of Marin was opposed to it, believing it unfair to other counties, and especially to those whose interests might conflict with those of San Francisco.

Conroy said he was opposed to appointing as a standing committee a delegation from any one city. "We are here," he said, "to legislate for the whole State."

On being put to vote, a division was called for, and the amendment was lost. Melick, who was last term a member of the Committee on Retrenchment, Public Expenditures and Commissions, offered an amendment striking out the word "retrenchment" from the title, as he and others had found that considerable odium attached to the word, and that it did not properly represent the purpose of the committee.

The standing rules were then adopted as amended, and ordered reprinted in the journal.

FOR AN APPELLATE COURT. Grove L. Johnson offered Assembly Constitutional Amendment No. 1.

This is in accordance with a suggestion made by Governor Gray in his inaugural speech that a great need in this State is getting a Court of Appeals. The amendment is to Article 6 of the Constitution of California, relating to the Judiciary Department and adds several sections to the article.

Section 25 provides that in addition to the courts heretofore established and now existing under the Constitution, there shall be a court to be known as the Appellate Court, to consist of a Chief Justice and four Associate Justices possessing the qualifications required in Justices of the Supreme Court.

The Appellate Court shall always be open for the transacting of business, and shall hold its regular sessions at such times and places as may be prescribed by law. Any three Justices may hear and finally decide any cause as matter within its jurisdiction, provided that when concurrence of the Justices is required, a majority of three Justices shall be necessary to a decision.

Section 26. The Justices of the Appellate Court shall be elected by the qualified electors of the State at large at the general State election at the time and places at which the Justices of the Supreme Court are elected, and the term of office shall be ten years from and after the first Monday after the first day of January next succeeding the election. The remainder of the section provides for the distribution of the shorter and longer terms among the first set of Justices elected, to be decided by themselves. The first Chief Justice is to be the one to whose lot falls the shortest term and he shall be succeeded by the Justice drawing the next shortest.

Section 27 provides that the Appellate Court shall have final and exclusive appellate jurisdiction on questions of law alone, in all criminal cases prosecuted by indictment or information in a court of record.

The Appellate Court is given power to issue writs of habeas corpus in any part of the State and make them returnable before itself or any Superior Court.

Other provisions are that the Justices may be removed in the same manner and for the same causes as those of the Supreme Court; that the Appellate shall be a court of record; that in all decrees its judgment shall be final after 30 days; that the Appellate Justices may act in the Supreme Court in case of need; that the salary of the Justices shall be \$6,000 each per annum.

RIVER IMPROVEMENT.

Pierce of Yolo offered A. C. R. No. 4, regarding Sacramento River improvement. The text of the resolution is given in that body a synonomous resolution was offered and adopted. The Assembly adopted the measure promptly.

It was, in construction, a joint resolution, but as the difference between a joint and a concurrent resolution is that the former must be printed before adoption and the latter need not, the more speedy method was desired in order to get the measure at once before Congress. As both Houses agreed on the matter there will be no delay.

MORE RESOLUTIONS.

By Arnerich—that the Sergeant-at-Arms or his bookkeeper be authorized to receipt to the Controller for all warrants for payments to members, officers and attaches of the Assembly.

By Ricard—that the Sergeant-at-Arms be directed to hire a box at the Sacramento Postoffice for the use of the Assembly and pay for the same from the contingent fund.

By Anderson—that the Sergeant-at-Arms provide three keystone patent binders for each member and for the Clerk's desk.

By Valentine—that 55 copies of Henning's Constitution of California, 2d edition, be provided for the members by the Sergeant-at-Arms.

NICARAGUA CANAL. Caminetti offered A. C. R. No. 5, as follows:

Whereas, There is now pending in the Congress of the United States a proposition to secure the construction of the Nicaragua Canal; whereas, the State of California will be materially benefited by the construction thereof. Therefore be it Resolved, by the Assembly, the Senate concurring, that we respectfully and urgently request Congress to provide for the construction of said canal by the Government of the United States, to be owned and operated by it, thus securing to our country the great benefit of a short and cheap waterway between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, open to all our people on equal terms with other discrimination.

Resolved, that the Governor of the State of California is respectfully requested to transmit a copy of these resolutions to the President of the United States, the Senate, the House of Representatives and to the California delegation in Congress.

Request of the author the resolution will be referred to the Committee on Federal Relations as soon as appointed.

Caminetti was granted leave of absence for three days, as also was Clark of Alameda, in whose family there had been a death.

During the latter part of the brief morning session Speaker pro tem Anderson was in the chair.

On motion of Dibble the Assembly adjourned at 11:30 until 9:30 this morning.

The Case of the Douglas Children. Eds. "Record-Union": The statement in your local columns, communicated to you, I assume, from outside sources, concerning the rejection of the two Douglas children by the Foundlings' Home because they were not properly clothed, is incorrect. I beg that you will permit me to state the facts.

First, ours is not an orphan asylum. We are primarily organized to care for the children of the State who are unfortunate because of the death of their parents. We have taken orphans, half orphans and others from time to time, to meet necessities, but we are not, under the law, obliged to accept such.

The two Douglas children, a girl and a boy, were brought to the home covered with vermin. A nurse took them to the bathroom and stripped them. It was found necessary to burn every stitch of clothing in which they came.

The hair was close clipped and washed and the girl, we discovered, was from crown to base of neck, entire raw by vermin. The children were then dressed, at the cost of the institution, in good clothing.

But these children could not be placed in the wards with our other children, for the reason that it takes several days to remove all danger of vermin being given to those with whom the infected come into contact. We accordingly sent the children back to the police, because we had no place in which to keep them. The girl, we discovered, also, is over the age permissible in our asylum. We can take no children over 10 years of age.
