SENATOR LODGE'S SPEECH.

Senator Lodge of Massachusetts has done the cause of his country distinct service by his timely and very concise and pointed speech upon the treaty question.

The author of the local option prohibition bill in our own Legislature may take some encouragement from the recent message of the Governor of South Carolina to the Legislature, advising that the whole question of the sale of liquors by retail or the refusal of license to sell, be committed to the people of the several counties of the State.

When we raised the flag over the Philippines we did it in the same spirit in which it was first raised over Independence Hall—in the spirit of mercy, justice to an oppressed people, and as a protest against tyranny, misrule and the repression of human rights.

He therefore concludes again, that the question before us is simply that of the ratification of the treaty, leaving all those of future disposition and control of the islands to wise consideration after the ratification of the convention between the United States and Spain.

But the United States Government has not proposed as yet to float an emblem of dominion over the Philippines. We are simply bringing to a perfect close a war still existing—only suspended by armistice agreement.

From the present outlook it would seem that a great deal of money and time have been wasted in chasing phantom rumors, in this matter of the Senatorial scandal investigation.

OPPENHEIMER MURDER CASE. The Defense Will Introduce Testimony This Morning.
