The committee appointed to investigate the newspaper charges brought against the Speaker of the Assembly, Howard E. Wright, yesterday handed in its report, and the wise ones are wondering when the much-talked-about "break" of the line-up for United States Senator will materialize.

IN RE THE SPEAKER.

Investigation Committee Renders Its Report to the Assembly.

The Denney-Ashe contest still drags its weary lengths along before the Senate Committee on Elections. Attorney Eugene F. Bert, for the contestant, has for the past two days been reading testimony and interjecting argument before the committee, and he seemed as fresh last night as he did at the start.

The Assembly waited long and late yesterday afternoon for the "Report of the Special Committee of Investigation of the Methods Employed in the Election of a United States Senator."

Harbor Improvement Bonds. In the Senate yesterday, interest centered on the bill to provide for the issuance of \$1,000,000 of State bonds for the improvement of the seawall and harbor at San Francisco.

Johnson of Sacramento, when the last word was spoken, moved that the report be made a special order for to-day at 11 o'clock a. m., and that it be printed in the Journal. Carried, and so ordered. Following is THE REPORT.

In the House yesterday the expectation of the report of the Investigation Committee had a more or less paralyzing effect on business. Committee meetings were sparsely attended or not held at all, and had it not been for the efforts of some of the old hands like Johnson, Dibble, Valentine and Beishaw, who kept the file machine grinding, very little would have been done.

Resolved, That a select committee of seven members of the Assembly be appointed by the Speaker pro tem, to immediately and fully, thoroughly and carefully, investigate each and all of said charges, whether direct or indirect, and also to investigate in like manner the methods used to influence members of the Assembly in their votes for United States Senator, and that said committee have full power to send for persons, books, telegrams and papers, and to employ a Clerk and Stenographer, and that it have leave to sit during the sessions of the Assembly, and that said committee report, fully, as speedily as possible, with such recommendations as it may deem proper."

As it was, however, a very respectable number of bills were passed and the debates had no special tinge of the acid. Indeed, some of the grey-haired legislators waxed funny over measures like the "golden poppy" bill, the "predacious insect" bill, the anti-have-your-picture-taken bill, and others.
