

CHIEF DWYER SUSTAINED.

MEETING OF THE POLICE COMMITTEE LAST NIGHT.

Straightening Out Matters Connected With Discipline of the Police Force.

A meeting of the Police Committee of the Board of Trustees was held last night at the Trustees' room, Trustees Tabbets, Douglas and Kent being present.

The complaint of Officer Pennish that he had been unnecessarily suspended for two days was taken up and Chief Dwyer stated that he had notified the officer to appear in the Carstenson saloon affair before the Board of Trustees, but he did not appear and claimed to have been sick.

Officer Pennish, who had appeared, stated that on the night in question he reported himself to the Sergeant in charge as being sick and the Sergeant said he would let the Chief. He went home and went to bed and when he reported for duty in the morning the Chief told him that as he was sick he would better take a couple of days to get well.

Trustee Kent said he knew of no authority in the charter that allows the Chief or Mayor to suspend an officer for a specified time. The officers did not feel that the Chief was entitled to suspend them at will.

Trustee Douglas read the provision of the charter that empowers the Chief of Police to suspend officers for disobedience or neglect of duty and report the matter to the board with the charges preferred.

Trustee Tabbets said perhaps if the case were taken into court the board might have to pay attention to the charges and perhaps dismiss the officer. During the suspension, another man had done duty for the officer and should certainly be paid for his work.

Chief Dwyer asked the officer if he had ever treated him otherwise than well and fairly and the latter answered that he never had thought so except on this occasion. He thought he should have been notified of the reason of his suspension.

Trustee Douglas moved that the Chief of Police be sustained, Trustee Tabbets seconded the motion. Trustee Kent opposed the motion, but it was carried, Trustee Tabbets and Douglas saying that the discipline of the department must be sustained.

President Morrison, Vice President A. J. Vermilya presided. The committees on Legislation, Game Warden and others made partial reports, and were allowed further time.
