NOTICE OF STREET WORK.

Office of Superintendent of Streets, Sacramento, February 1, 1899. Public notice is hereby given that the Board of Trustees of the City of Sacramento, passed on the 28th day of January, 1899, a Resolution of Intention, No. 405, providing:

That Eighth street, in said city, from the south line of J street to the north line of K street, be improved by removing cobble, grading and laying a streetway of concrete six (6) inches in thickness and with a top coating of bituminous rock two and one-quarter (2 1/4) inches in thickness; grooved rock gutters five (5) feet wide; altering three (3) old catch basins; constructing one (1) new catch basin and connecting the same to the sewer with six (6) inch ironstone pipe; constructing granite curbs where no granite curbs exist and constructing granite round corners at the alley intersection where no granite round corners exist.

And all parties interested are referred to said resolution a copy of which is on file in the Superintendent of Streets' office, for further particulars.
