the course of which Stratton stated his belief that it passed as it came from the committee the bill would be unconstitutional.

A. B. 84, Sanford—To provide a lunch hour for laborers in sawmills, shingle mills, shake mills and logging camps, was read the second time and ordered on file for third reading.

A. B. 103, Dunlap—Providing for the dissolution and annulment of swamp and overflowed land reclamation districts and protection districts for non-users of corporate powers. Committee amendments adopted, and bill ordered engrossed and read for third reading.

BILLS PASSED. The Senate third reading file was taken up, and the following bills were acted upon:

S. B. 151, Dickinson—Authorizing the Attorney General to settle and dismiss a certain action entitled "The People of the State of California ex rel. E. P. Colgan, State Controller, plaintiff, vs. J. N. E. Wilson, F. C. De Long and J. D. Byrnes, defendants," wherein judgment was obtained against the defendants in the Superior Court of the County of Sacramento, State of California, in and to the sum of \$5,000 in said court, which judgment was affirmed by the Supreme Court of the State of California, upon the payment to him for the use of the State of the sum of \$500.00, heretofore paid by said J. N. E. Wilson into the Superior Court, and upon the further consideration of an assignment by said J. N. E. Wilson to the State of California all of his right, title and interest in and to any and all of the moneys deposited by the said J. N. E. Wilson as Insurance Commissioner, in the Pacific Bank of San Francisco, and now remaining therein. Read third time and passed—28 to 0. Title approved.

S. B. 65, Sims—To add a new section to the Political Code, to be known as Section 738, relating to the term of office of public and making the term of office four years. Read third time and passed—32 to 0. Title approved.

S. B. 66, Smith, Committee on Judiciary—To amend Section 844 of the Code of Civil Procedure, relating to summons and judgments. Amended and ordered printed.

S. B. 82, Smith—Authorizing the State Treasurer to furnish his office and the vault therein, and making an appropriation of \$7,500 for the same. Read third time and passed—25 to 3. Title approved.

S. B. 32, Ash—To amend Section 695 of the Civil Code, relative to powers of benevolent corporations, limiting their property holdings to allow the Bohemian Club of San Francisco to own 100 acres of land. Passed—27 to 0. Title approved.

SECOND READING. On motion of Dickinson, the second reading file was taken up, and the following bills read:

S. B. 325, Stratton—To provide for the erection of buildings and certain improvements for the University of California and its affiliated colleges, and appropriating \$88,500 for the purpose. Read and to third reading.

S. B. 9, Curtin—To amend an Act in relation to foreign corporations, approved April 1, 1872. Committee amendments adopted and bill ordered printed.

S. B. 67, Stratton—Adding a new section to the Political Code of this State, to be known as designated as Section 1118, providing for registration and the use of registers at primary elections. Withdrawn by author, and S. B. 251, relating to mutual fire insurance companies, substituted, amended and ordered printed.

S. B. 214, Hoy—To compel employers to furnish medical and surgical attendance to employees injured during working hours in mills, factories, shipyards, foundries and other places where machinery is used. Ordered to third reading.

S. B. 178, Braunhart—Add a new section to the Political Code of California, to be known as Section 635 thereof, relating to the form of fire insurance policies, read and ordered engrossed for third reading.

TRANSPORTING INSANE. Then Braunhart's bill, 176, governing the transportation of the insane from the counties in which they have been committed, to the asylums of the State of California, and designating the person or persons who shall convey such insane persons to said asylums, was taken up and the Senate was thrown into a chaos of debate. Two years ago an identical bill was up for consideration and was defeated by a slim majority, and that portion of the members who desired to have cheveries or their deputies continue to convey insane persons to State Hospitals instead of hospital attendants, were out to kill it before it found a place on the third reading file.

Cutter said there was no possible chance for the bill to pass, and in order that it might no longer encumber the files he moved that it be denied a second reading.

Rowell of Fresno protested against such a proceeding and said he had an amendment which would, he believed, remove all objectionable features.

Cutter withdrew his motion and the bill was read. Several amendments were offered by Rowell, all of which were voted down, and then Cutter moved that the bill be denied engrossment.

The motion created a perfect avalanche of oratory, fully half of the members relieving themselves by "hipping up" either the bill, or the Sheriffs of the several counties.

In the end the motion was carried by a vote of 25 to 7, and the bill was denied engrossment.

WRONG REFERENCE. Dickinson, for the Finance Committee, reported back S. B. 125, providing for an increase in the number of members of the Auditing Board to the Commissioner of Public Works, recommending that it be referred to the Committee on Public, Swamp and Overflowed Lands. He explained that the bill carried an appropriation, and the bill was referred as recommended.

ELIMINATION AND INSERTION. Cutter offered a resolution providing for the elimination of the name of John Jones from the list of committee clerks, and the insertion of that of George Ross. He explained that that particular bit of porridge had fallen to the lot of Senator Luchman and that the latter had inserted the name of John Jones until he could decide which of his constituents he would accommodate. He had finally decided on Ross. The resolution was adopted.

A resolution by Smith to furnish to the State Mailings Clerks postage stamps to the value of \$20 was referred to the Committee on Contingent expenses.

MORE BILLS. Bills were introduced as follows: Wolfe—To regulate telephone charges and to revise and regulate the same.

Cutter—S. J. R. 18, relative to the Yosemite National Park Federal Relations.

Wolfe—To provide for the government of State Normal Schools. Education and Public Morals.

To amend sections of the Political Code relating to public schools. Education and Public Morals.

Bulla—Proposing an amendment to Section 1, of Article IV, of the Constitution, relating to legislative powers. Judiciary.

Hall—To prevent disease from the fumes of garbage crematories. Hospitals.

COMMITTEE REPORTS. Shortridge, for Commerce, Harbors and Rivers—S. B. 64, relating to the powers of the State Harbor Commissioners of San Diego Bay. Do pass as amended.

Boyer, for Education and Public Morals—S. B. 464, relative to permissive physical examinations by Boards of School Trustees, and providing for a Bureau of Child Study; 88, for the suppression of bucket shops, and gambling in stocks, bonds, petroleum, cotton, grain, produce or other produce; 255, for the submission of the proposition of the license and sale, or prohibition of the sale of intoxicants, to a vote of the people by municipal corporations of the fifth and sixth class. Do pass.

At 4:50 o'clock the Senate adjourned until this morning.

IN THE ASSEMBLY.

Long, Busy and Eventful Day in the House.

Immediately after the regular morning opening of the Assembly yesterday and the correction and approval of the Journals of Saturday and Monday the reports from the standing committees were in order.

JUDICIARY. Johnson, of the Judiciary, reported back bills as follows:

Dunlap's A. B. 183, amending the Act relating to foreign corporations; Works' A. B. 188, to add a new section to the Code of Civil Procedure concerning the manner in and the time within which certain objections to depositions shall be made, and Johnson's A. B. 384, relating to "grab stake" contracts—that they pass as amended.

Also Dibble's A. B. 95, for the reappointment of the Board of Supreme Court Commissioners, that it do pass and that it go to Ways and Means.

Also Valentine's A. B. 482, amending the Code of Civil Procedure, 508, amending the Code of Civil Procedure, that they do pass.

Also Dibble's A. B. 470, introduced by request, relating to the appointment of guardians of insane and incompetent persons—that the author be allowed to withdraw the bill. Dibble consented and it was ordered.

WAYS AND MEANS. Valentine reported back Cospers' resolution providing for the purchase of several sets of codes with slips and annotations for each of some dozen counties, Johnson—that it be not adopted.

Also, Johnson's A. B. 573, to pay the claims of the survivors of Ida McNeill Smith (\$10,000)—without recommendation.

Also Valentine's A. B. 272, abolishing the position of Revenue Clerk and creating the office of expert to the Controller and fixing his salary; Miller's A. B. 279, to pay the claim of Major Jose Ramon Pico; Boynton's A. B. 326, for improving the State Fish Hatcheries in Sisson and Price Creek; and Fairweather's A. B. 538, authorizing the appointment of a Commissioner of Irrigation—that they do pass.

Also Melick's A. B. 418, providing for the study of the water supply and location of reservoir sites—that the author be permitted to withdraw. So ordered.

ROADS AND HIGHWAYS. Melick reported back Johnson's A. B. 11, for the Folsom highway, that it be not adopted, and a committee substitute therefor was favorably reported and referred to Ways and Means.

Also Brooke's A. B. 254 and 255, relating to highways and highway taxes, favorably and that they be referred to Judiciary.

Also Dibble's A. B. 337, relating to the duties of Boards of Supervisors respecting roads—that the author withdraw as a substitute offered some days ago. So ordered.

Also Brooke's A. B. 392, for the licensing of bicycles, tricycles, etc.—that it do pass; also committee bills 582 and 583 relating to highway taxes, that they do pass, and that Mack's A. B. 239, relative to rates of toll to be posted at gates, do pass as amended.

Robinson, of Mines and Mining, reported back favorably on Cambetti's A. B. 140, repealing the Act prescribing the manner of locating mining claims.

COMMERCE AND NAVIGATION. Knowland reported favorably on S. B. 34, for the seawall of San Francisco harbor; DeLaney's A. B. 334, to transfer to the San Francisco Harbor Improvement fund money now in the San Francisco Depot Sinking fund, and Kelsey's A. B. 450, relating to the appointment of pilot Commissioners for San Francisco, Mare Island and Benicia.

RESOLUTIONS. Knowland, of Commerce and Navigation, offered a resolution calling for the payment of \$144 mileage for his committee on their recent visit to the harbors of the bay of San Francisco. Adopted.

THE OLD TROUBLE. Lundquist, of the Committee on Attachments, made a report from that committee, embodying the various claims for employees who have been working in various capacities about the Assembly without having been appointed. These claims, offered originally as resolutions by various members, were some of them adopted on the spot and others referred to the Committee on Attachments. Lundquist's report, in effect, left the matter with the House.

Raddiff moved that the matter be referred to the Committee on Attachments, inasmuch as the condition of my hearing, Beishaw, may not be able to appear in person at the bar of the Assembly in the near future.

I realize that your honorable body has awaited a time with patience, in my case, and I assure you that it has been a matter of regret that I have been compelled to ask your indulgence in this behalf.

I testified before the committee and here repeat, that I never at any time or place paid any money or other consideration, or offered or promised to pay any money or other consideration to any person in return for any assistance from him.

Your committee has so found in their report and have also found that all moneys expended by me were legitimately expended, and your honorable body has adopted this report.

I failed to answer before the committee would in no instance show improper, illegitimate or corrupt use of money, nor could such answers, if made, change in the least the findings already included in the committee's report, and adopted by the Assembly. The honorable members of the committee, and I am proud to say, have not only been diligent in their duties, but have also been diligent in their efforts to do justice to the public.

Wright called up Senate messages in order that the Senate concurrent resolution permitting the Lieutenant Governor a six months' absence from the State might at once be acted on. It was explained that the health of the Lieutenant Governor required the asked for change. The resolution was unanimously adopted.

Ways and Means.

An Act making an appropriation of \$75,000 for the support of the State Printing Office. Second reading file.

Bliss—For the relief of Hugo Dugmunt, executor of the last will of Eugene Dugmunt, deceased, for monum-entary collateral bequests provided for in said will. Claims.

Cospers—To amend the County and Township Government Act. Judiciary.
