It is Getting a Firm Foothold in This City. Robert Williamson, the County Horticultural Inspector, states that a very large percentage of the orange trees in the city are badly infested with the red scale, and that it is the most difficult of all scales to combat. There are parasites in the different kinds of lady bugs, for most of the other kinds of scale, but for the red scale no parasitic enemy has yet been found. Consequently it must be fought by artificial means, and there are very few known remedies for it. Unless these remedies are properly prepared and administered, they will be of little or no benefit, and in some cases, even they prove ineffective. It is suggested as dangerous to employ any one to disinfect for this scale unless he has a certificate from the Inspector or one of the County Horticultural Commissioners. The three Commissioners are H. W. Johnson, E. Booth and George H. Cutler, and Robert Williamson is the legally commissioned Inspector. Mr. Williamson is instructed by the Commissioners to canvass the entire city and locate all the infested trees. Then he or the Commissioners will engage some responsible person to do the disinfecting, and will see that he does the work thoroughly, and not overcharge the property owner. The Inspector, but the owner of the trees must pay a reasonable charge for disinfecting. The law on the subject is very rigid, and the Commissioners will enforce it if it becomes necessary to do so, for they see the necessity of stopping this plague before it ruins all of the orange and lemon trees.

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Weather Reports. The Weather Bureau reports show the highest and lowest temperatures yesterday to have been 72 and 52 degrees, with fresh to brisk and high northerly winds and clear weather prevailing. The barometrical readings at 5 a. m. and 5 p. m. yesterday were 30.06 and 30.00 inches, respectively. The highest and lowest temperatures one year ago yesterday were 54 and 41 degrees, with no rain, and one year ago to-day 55 and 40 degrees, with 1.0 of an inch of rain. The average temperature was 62 degrees, and the normal 51, showing yesterday to have been eleven degrees warmer than usual for the 20th day of February. River 12 feet rising. This rise is due to the excessive and unusual heat of the past few days, which is melting the snow in the mountains. The highest wind velocity yesterday was 30 miles per hour, from the north, and is a very drying wind for so early in the season.

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
