

ANTI-CARTOON BILL AMENDED.

(Continued from Fourth Page.)

said the speaker, "the bill was attacked; draw your own conclusion." Time was, he said, when the columns of newspapers voiced public opinion, and it was to check such journals as those which sold their stumps that legislation was needed. He called on the Senate to vote not only for the bill under consideration, but for all the several newspaper bills which had been introduced.

Curtin, the author of the amendment, contended that there was no protection for the people under the present libel law. The proposed amendment, he said, merely made the man who drew the caricature equally guilty with the editor who published it. If the law would reach the artist as well as the editor, the former would decline to make pictures for which he would be liable to arrest. There was no need, he contended, of legislating against the respectable papers of the State. There was no cause to legislate to restrict the Sacramento "Record-Union" or the Stockton "Mail" or "Independent." It was only intended to legislate against papers which struck at decency, at virtue and at the home.

AMENDMENTS ADOPTED. It was 9:45 o'clock, and the motion being on Leavitt's amendment, to insert the word "ridiculous" it was adopted by a viva voce vote. The question falling on Curtin's amendment, it was adopted by the following vote:

Leavitt moved that S. B. 128, 322, 530 and 386, all relating to newspapers, be made a special order for this evening, but in the face of a threatened roll-call withdrew his motion.

An attempt was made at 9:40 a. m. yesterday to convene the Assembly, but no quorum being present, recess was taken until 10:15 a. m., at which hour there was better success.

The Journal of Saturday was corrected and approved. Cosper called attention to an error in the footing in the bill of one of the contestants in the report of the Committee on Contested Elections, and asked that the sum of \$329.15 be made \$529.15. So ordered.

On motion of Dibble, the report of the Committee on Rules and Regulations, making a special urgency file of the Committee on the Ways and Means Committee for Tuesday, Thursday and Friday evenings, was adopted.

ENROLLMENT.

Richard of the Committee on Enrollment, reported the following bills properly enrolled and sent to the Governor on February 20th: Rickard's A. B. 23, making it a misdemeanor to remove, destroy or deface trademark or name on packages of whatever sort of merchandise; Kelley's A. B. 42, amending the Act granting yearly vacations to members of paid fire departments; Arnerich's A. B. 157, to prevent the shipment of infected fruits out of California; Bliss' A. B. 229, making the golden poppy the State flower; and Merritt's A. C. R. 13, approving the charter of Santa Barbara.

During the forenoon, Brown, in absence granted Kenneth, Wright and Clough.

On motion of Caminetti, the order of business under the head of introduction of bills was continued open until adjournment last evening, yesterday being the last day on which bills could be introduced except through the Standing Committee of three appointed under the new standing rule adopted last week.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

The following list, introduced throughout the day and evening, in squads of one and singly, is given as nearly as possible in good order: Meade—To pay the mileage of Thos. B. Toland, Trustee of the State Normal School at San Diego, to the State meeting of directors at San Jose.

Crowley—To provide for the transportation of non-citizen inmates of the

State Hospital for the Insane. State Hospitals and Asylums.

Cobb—To enable all counties, incorporated towns or cities or consolidated cities and counties of this State to use automatic ballot or voting machines at all elections therein. Election Laws. Wade—To pay \$1,125 to Denis Spencer. Ways and Means.

Johnson—To provide for construction of a sewerage system at Folsom State Prison and to make an appropriation. Ways and Means. Dibble—To amend the Penal Code. Judiciary.

Conroy—To amend the Political Code relating to the printing of legislative bills. Judiciary. Works—To establish a restaurant and barber shop with baths attached, in the basement of the Capitol and appropriating the sum of \$5,000 therefor. Public Works and State Capitol.

Valentine—To amend the Civil Code. Judiciary. Committee on Ways and Means—To pay deficiency in Attorney-General's office for fifth fiscal year.

White—To amend Section 134, Code of Civil Procedure, relating to holidays. Judiciary. White—To amend Section 7 of the Civil Code relating to holidays. Judiciary.

White—To amend the Political Code relating to holidays. Judiciary. Glenn—To pay the claims of the Williams "Farmer," \$213. Ways and Means.

Crowder—Regulating passenger rates of transportation and providing a penalty a fine of not less than \$200 nor more than \$1,000. Corporations. Crowder—To regulate operation of sleeping cars, providing as penalty a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$500. Corporations.

Merrill—To require packers of canned goods to stamp both ends of tin of canned goods with date of year when canned. Fruit and Vine. Meade—To repeal the Act to encourage and provide for general vaccination. Public Health and Quarantine.

Meade—To provide for redemption of lands sold under delinquent assessment for public work in municipalities and define rights and duties of purchasers and delinquent property owners in such cases. Meade—To amend the Political Code by adding new section thereto relating to the redemption of lands sold previous to March 28, 1895, for delinquent taxes to purchasers other than the State of California and municipalities. At the usual hour, just after the close of the regular daily joint Senatorial convention, the House took a recess until 2 p. m.

During the joint convention Caminetti had offered a resolution on the subject of the election of United States Senators, which was declared out of order at that time.

On reconvening he introduced the same matter as

Whereas, the present method of electing Senators of the United States has been and is productive of results inimical to the general welfare, and threatening the usefulness of a body representing the people of the several States of the Union; and

Whereas, the various States have repeatedly applied to Congress for the submission to the people thereof, in the manner prescribed by the Constitution of the United States, of an amendment to such Constitution, providing that Senators of the United States shall be elected by popular vote; and

Whereas, the House of Representatives of the United States has at different times answered the popular demand for the passage of the necessary legislation; and

Whereas, the Senate of the United States has often failed to concur therein; and

Whereas, the people of the State of California have at an election by direct vote on the question, declared almost unanimously in favor of the election of such Senators by the people; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States in Congress assembled, That such committee be and is hereby appointed to prepare a memorial addressed to the Legislatures of the several States requesting application by each thereof, in the manner prescribed by Article V. of the Constitution of the United States, petitioning Congress to call a convention for proposing amendments to the National Constitution on this and such other subjects as the public welfare may demand; and be it further

Resolved, That such committee be instructed to provide in its report a method for the transmission of such memorial to the Legislatures of the several States; and be it further

Resolved, That such committee shall submit such memorial to the Senate and Assembly of the State of California within five days after its appointment.

As a companion to this, and necessary to its completeness, the following was offered:

A. J. R. 25. Whereas, the present method of electing Senators of the United States has been and is productive of results inimical to the general welfare, and threatening the usefulness of a body representing the sovereignty of the several States of the Union; and

Whereas, the various States have repeatedly applied to Congress for submission to the people of the several States, in the manner prescribed by the Constitution of the United States, for an amendment to such Constitution, providing that Senators of the United States shall be elected by popular vote; and

Whereas, the House of Representatives has at different times answered the popular demand for the passage of the necessary legislation; and

Whereas, the Senate of the United States has as often failed to concur therein; and

Whereas, the people of the State of California have at an election by direct vote on the question declared almost unanimously in favor of the election of such Senators by the people; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Assembly, the Senate concurring, That a committee of three members of the Senate and three members of the Assembly be and is hereby appointed to prepare an application to the Congress of the United States, under the provisions of Article V. of the Constitution of the United States, petitioning Congress to call a convention for proposing amendments to the National Constitution, in this




