HOW TO RECEIVE THEM.

The proposition to raise money to give the California troops when they return from the Philippines a rousing reception, is commented upon by several of our contemporaries without special dissent, but with very frank statement of opinion that the really noble and practical thing to do is to organize and secure ways and means to give these soldiers employment very soon after they have returned to their homes.

A San Jose contemporary says that many discharged volunteers who left good positions to serve their country, are now begging in this State with not a finger lifted to add them to that they want, opportunity to earn their living and to regain their old place in life.

It will be an ineffable blot upon the fair fame of California if these soldiers who have fought so well, endured so much in a foreign clime, and who gave up good positions to take up our arms for the flag are found begging on the streets or wandering about unable to secure employment at fair wages.

It is this is not done what shall we have with which to fortify a second appeal to our young men when there is another call to arms for the honor and defense of the country?

Mr. Assistant Secretary of State Hill puts it well when he says: "Precisely what our ultimate relation should be to the territories over which Spain abandons her sovereignty is a question to be determined by the future."

MAKING RAINSTORMS.

Down in Southern California, where they need rain even more than we of this section, Professor Lowe proposed to produce rain if the people would raise \$8,000 to pay the cost of the necessary explosives and building of the magazine he proposed to blow up by way of bombarding the skies.

The thoughtful will conclude that these generalizations are weak because they have no personal application, and are indulged in simply because they have been spoken and written of every Legislature.

YELLOW JOURNALISM IN FRANCE

Yellow journalism generally overshoots its mark. As it is here, so in France, it seems that the sensational papers there posing, as here, as the great-hearted friends of the people, the masses, the workers, the taxpayers, are making all sorts of attacks upon the new President Loubet, because he rose from lowly position, is the son of a family of workers, people of lowly origin and uneducated manners.

Accordingly the yellow journals of Paris have turned their guns upon the aged mother of the President, who is nearing the end of her life and is a woman of humble origin and unpolished manners, but was notable as a mother who brought her children up in the straight path and gave them the training that has made one of them President of the republic.

That is an agreeable break in the current of newspaper and pulpit denunciation of our common country for having done what it was impossible to avoid with honor.

That is a decided mistake. We tolerate anything. The rawer and meaner and more vulgar it is, the more the immunity it enjoys.
