M., on March 29, 1898, and was captured by Sheriff Utah last Tuesday by Sheriff Butt, was placed in jail at this place to-day, along with the robbers who held up a Southern Pacific train at Humboldt, Nev., on the 14th of last July.

PROF. KNAPP'S REPORT.

Asiatic Seeds and Plants Selected for Experiments.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—Professor S. A. Knapp, the special Commissioner of Secretary Wilson to the Orient to investigate the availability of eastern plants and seeds for common use in this country and secure specimens of those that are valuable, has submitted his preliminary report summing up the work.

PROF. KNAPP'S REPORT.

The number of seeds and plants selected for experiment include persimmons, bamboo, Japan plums, pears, camphor trees and hark. All the persimmon and pear seedlings have been distributed to experiment stations and the rest soon will be at hand for experiment. As to the persimmons, Professor Knapp found very few varieties sufficiently tested to be worthy of introduction.
