

LATEST ADVICES FROM HAWAII.

Funeral of Princess Kaiulani Takes Place at Honolulu.

American Soldiers and Sailors Prominent in the Line of March.

Impressive Services at the Church, Attended by President Dole and Cabinet, Justices of the Supreme Court and Other American and Hawaiian Officials.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 24.—The steamer Doric, which arrived from the Orient, via Honolulu, during this morning, brings the following advices to the Associated Press:

HONOLULU, March 17.—The funeral of the late Princess Kaiulani took place on Sunday, the 12th inst. Her body was placed in the royal mausoleum beside that of her mother.

The day of the funeral broke with the rain, which had been intermittent throughout the six days of her lying in state, still falling in torrents. But toward 10 o'clock in the morning the sun broke through the clouds, and from then until the last of the thousands who followed her to the grave or paid the respect of their presence at the funeral had returned to their homes the clouds respected the occasion. Until midnight there was no rain.

On the day preceding the funeral the remains lay in state at Kawaiahaeo Church, and thousands took a last look at the well-remembered face. At midnight the girls of Kawaiahaeo Seminary sang several selections in the choir.

The funeral was set for 2 o'clock p. m. Long before that hour the street in the vicinity of Kawaiahaeo Church began to fill up. The entire community, augmented by hundreds from the other islands, began to wend their way toward the church or take a position along the line of march of the funeral procession. The organizations which were to be in the procession were early and promptly in the positions designated for them. The hearse, drawn by 220 Hawaiians, uniformed in white trousers, blue jerseys and white hats, and wearing yellow sashes, was drawn up King street to the church at 1 o'clock.

The United States Volunteer Engineers, marched from their camp and formed in battalion front on the mauka side of King street, between Punchbowl and Richards streets. The First Regiment, National Guards of Hawaii, marched from the church to the vault, first to Punchbowl street and formed facing the church on Punchbowl street. The blue jackets from the United States ships Scandia and Iroquois took position on King street, to the right of the engineers. The various civic and Hawaiian societies and the pupils from the various schools and colleges took position on King street. Inside the churchyard were the carriages for the family and friends and the officials who were to follow the hearse. On King street hundreds of private carriages were in waiting.

Long before the funeral hour people began going to the church, but though the doors were kept open, there was no unseemly crowding. The public respected the occasion, and there was no difficulty experienced in keeping the seats reserved for special persons. At no time was the church overcrowded. The scene about the catafalque was much the same as on Saturday. The catafalque itself, placed just in front of the pulpit, was covered with a royal pall of velvet, and another of yellow made of filimas. The white casket was almost buried in floral pieces, which kept coming in up to the last moment. On each side of the casket large royal kahalis or koo staffs were placed, two large white ones at the head, two smaller white ones at the foot, and between them others, some black, some black and gold, and some of other colors, stood on the head of the coffin. Were lighted candles in a silver candelabrum. In the aisle near the head of the casket were two large kahalis of filima and ferns sent by Prince David Kawananakoa.

The pulpit was covered with filima. The choir from the cathedral were banked with flowers and ferns, filima leis being prominent.

The services in the church were very impressive. Seats were reserved on the left of the catafalque for the President and Cabinet and the Justices of the Supreme Court, the Judges of the Circuit Court and other American and Hawaiian officials.

While the church was filling the organist played softly. At 2 o'clock the Bishop of Honolulu, preceded and accompanied by the Anglican clergy and the surpliced choir, came in in procession.

The services began with the organ selection, "In Memoriam," composed on the death of the Princess Kaiulani, mother of Kaiulani, Bishop Willis read the sentences from the burial services, beginning, "I am the resurrection and the life."

The Kawaiahaeo Church choir sang, "Brief Life Is Here Our Portion," in Hawaiian. Following the scripture lesson, Psalm xxiii, was chanted.

The girls from Kamehameha School, all dressed in white, with black hatbands and a knot of black, yellow and red ribbon on the left shoulder, had seats assigned to them on the right side of the church. The remainder of the church was open to the general public.

The military division was led by the Volunteer Engineers, Major Langfitt commanding, Lieutenant Coolidge Adjutant. The American bluejackets were in command of Lieutenant W. E. Safford. The First Regiment, National Guard of Hawaii, consisting of seven companies, then followed.

Following the military were the Protestant clergy, the Catholic clergy, with the Bishop of Panopolis, the choir, the officiating clergy and the Bishop of Honolulu, all in full uniform. Then came the hearse, drawn by Hawaiians, with the pallbearers, kahili-bearers and torch-bearers on either side.

Beside the hearse were the carriages containing the mourners, and the officiating clergy, with kahili-bearers on either side, and then the carriages containing the President, the Cabinet, Consular Corps and other officials.

The military and civic portion of the procession formed within the mausoleum grounds in battalion front around the catafalque.

Within the vault were admitted only the choir, clergy and pall-bearers and attendants and mourners. The services in the mausoleum were those of the burial service, the choir singing the hymn. The mausoleum is a vaulted structure, the scene and service being very effective.

The entire line of march of the procession was crowded on both sides of the street with spectators. It is estimated that fully 25,000 persons took part in the procession or witnessed it. The procession itself was so long as to require forty minutes to pass a given point.

The ship Star of Bengal, Captain Henry Henderson, forty-eight days from Newcastle, arrived off port on the 15th, with her cargo of coal heated and danger of fire breaking out.

The ship is bound for San Francisco, but in the opinion of her captain, the Captain thought it dangerous to proceed without an official investigation. So he put in here. He applied to Collector of Customs McStocker for the appointment of a Board of Survey to investigate the condition of the cargo. This application was brought up a legal complication. The Star of Bengal is flying the Hawaiian flag, under a temporary register issued by Consul Wilder at San Francisco. The Government has refused to recognize these temporary registers. To have appointed a Board of Survey would have been a recognition of this one by the Collector General. But the ship having no other register, could not apply to a Consul for the appointment of a board. Collector McStocker consulted with the Cabinet about the matter, and it was decided that, in order not to embarrass the ship, her officers, charterers or owners or the owners of the cargo, the Collector General should appoint the Board of Survey asked for, upon the Captain and all others here interested in the ship or cargo filing a stipulation that this action should not be construed as in any way recognizing the temporary register or in any way affecting the question of registry.

On the 16th the Board of Survey recommended that the vessel discharge her cargo at this port.

She was towed into the harbor and is now anchored in naval row.

The board found the temperature of the cargo ranging from 80 to 100 degrees and more.

William O. Smith, who has been Attorney General since the overthrow of the monarchy, has requested President Dole to accept his resignation, handed in last August.
