

GRAND EVENT IN LOCAL HISTORY.

The Approaching Conclave of Knights Templar.

Street Pageant of Unusual Grandeur and Interest—The City to Be Handsomely Decorated.

Present indications are that the annual meeting of the Grand Commandery of California, Knights Templar, and the Department Conclave, to be held in this city on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of next week, will prove an unqualified success.

From advices received by the General Committee, which has the matter in hand, it is believed that at least four hundred, and possibly five hundred, Knights will march in the parade which will take place at 2 p. m. Thursday, the 20th instant. Ten of the fifteen commanderies in this department will send two hundred delegates, and the committee have good reason to believe that at least two hundred will arrive from the other five, and from commanderies in the southern part of the State.

Grand Master of the Grand Encampment, Reuben H. Lloyd, will be in attendance, and his arrival is looked forward to with interest, inasmuch as it will be the first time in its history that the Grand Commandery of California has been visited by a Grand Master of the United States.

The Grand Commandery and escort will arrive Wednesday evening, the 19th, from Los Angeles, and will be received by the local Knights.

The opening of the Grand Commandery will be the order of business Thursday morning, and at 2 p. m. the parade will take place. It will be under the command of Eminent Sir George W. McKee of San Jose, Grand Captain General, and Eminent Sir T. W. Heintzelman of Sacramento will be Chief of Staff.

As nearly as can be ascertained the line of march will be from Masonic Temple at Sixth and K streets, up K to Tenth, to J, to Second, to K, to Tenth, to L, the review to be held on L street, between Tenth and Fifteenth.

The General Committee have assurance that business houses and private residences along the line of march will be appropriately decorated, and no doubt exist but that the city will present a gala day appearance, and that everything possible will be done for the comfort of visiting Knights. It is proposed to welcome them right royally, and leave with them no regrets that they chose this city as the place wherein to hold the meeting of the conclave.

The General Committee is considering the advisability of arranging for a second parade to be held on Saturday, the 22d, at 2 o'clock; it is probable that arrangements will be made to that end. Whether or not it will be held has not yet been decided.

Whether or not it will be held has not yet been decided. Captain General of El Dorado Commandery, C. A. Swisher of Placerville, was in this city yesterday, and informed the members of the committee that El Dorado Commandery will turn out thirty-five strong, and will bring its own band.

Companies will be formed to consist of a Captain General, two Wardens and from twenty-four to thirty-six Sir Knights. When a commandery reports with a small number of Sir Knights, they will be consolidated with other commanderies as may be convenient.

Tactics, par. 345 and 352. Such standards as may be displayed will be placed in the left files of the second companies of a battalion. The Standard Bearers will be placed in the ranks and not march separately or between the subdivisions. Tactics, par. 345 and 359.

3. The formation of the brigade for the parade on Thursday, April 20th, will be according to the principles as given in Tactics, par. 349 and 449, and the line will form on the east side of Sixth street, facing west, with the right resting on K street, Battalion commanders may form their commands in such manner and at such places as may be convenient, but they will march their commands to the place of formation in column of three and form line as soon as the organization to their right has formed line and taken proper distance.

The positions of the Grand Commandery and battalions are given approximately as follows: The Grand Commandery between K street and L street, its right resting on K street.

The First Battalion between K street and L street, its right within twenty paces of the Grand Commandery.

The Second Battalion between L street and M street, its right resting within twenty paces of the First Battalion.

The Third Battalion between M street and N street, its right resting within twenty paces of the Second Battalion.

The Grand Officers and Past Grand Commanders in carriages, within twenty paces and to the left of the Third Battalion.

The Grand Commandery must first form line, taking as base, or point of rest, the southeast corner of K street and Sixth street, distant three paces from the curb. Each battalion commander will immediately and successively form his line, take proper distance dressing to the right. Bands will take position as ordered, and battalion commanders will see that the distance of twenty paces is maintained between battalions, allowing for bands.

4. The parade will be formed at 2 o'clock p. m., and all commanding officers will report to the Grand Captain General the formation of their commands on the brigade line, and not later than 1:45 o'clock p. m.

Hundreds of Men Required for the Yuba Electric Extension.
