WAS CURTIS IN THIS CITY?

THE FUGITIVE'S TRAIL FROM FOLSOM THIS WAY.

Suspicion That He Accompanied Henry Here—Two Men Seen at Perkins.

After relating the details of the shooting of Bert Hicks at Folsom a week ago and the flight of Marvin Curtis and William Henry, the "Telegraph" of Saturday says:

"Constable Donnelly picked up the bicycle trail again at the box factory and it was easily followed to Natoma. A workman walking up the road told him that two bicyclists at Perkins, saying that an officer had shot at one of them three times."

"Deputy Hinters says that he saw only one bicyclist, whom he shot at when the fellow refused to stop. That happened about 3:15 in the morning. The delay of the fleeing man, or men, is explained by the fact that they were caught for a time back of the slaughter house."

"The man Hinters shot at proved to be William Henry of Orangevale. He continued on into the city, crossed the Twelfth-street bridge, and met a friend in Fair Oaks on the road to the city."

"Henry got into the wagon with his friend, returned to the city and got himself arrested at the Sheriff's office about 10 o'clock."
