MEZGER'S CHILD.
The Father Given Full Control and Custody of the Child.
In October of last year Judge Hughes issued an order giving J. F. Mezger, who lives in Rocklin, Placer County, the control and possession of his six-year-old daughter, Euphemia, with the provision that she should be allowed to visit her great-uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. John Whitelaw in this city, and that they should visit her.
On Wednesday last Mezger petitioned for a modification of the order, so as to remove the visiting provision, alleging as a cause for such action that Mr. and Mrs. Whitelaw were not proper persons to have custody of the child, and Judge Hughes named yesterday as the date for hearing the petition.

Mr. Whitelaw's attorney, after explaining to the Court that it would take at least a day to hear evidence on the allegations of the petition (a synopsis of which was published in Thursday's issue of the "Record-Union"), petitioned to make no objection to the modification of the order of October, 1898, provided the petition be withdrawn so as not to appear on record against Mr. and Mrs. Whitelaw.
Judge Hughes made an order modifying the order so as to give Mezger complete custody and control of the child, and another withdrawing the petition.
